Coach Vance Law

Coach Vance Law is in his 13th season as head coach at BYU. He played 14 years of pro ball, including 11 years in the majors with six different teams. In 2001 he was named Coach of the Year in the Mountain West Conference. The 55-year-old coach entered this season with a 375-321-2 (.539) record. He is assisted by Ryan Roberts, in his 10th year at BYU. Last Fall, pitching coach Wally Ritchie replaced Bobby Applegate, now at UC Riverside

Series Record vs. LMU

BYU has a 1-4 record (all in California) against Loyola Marymount, most recently playing in 1972. The only game BYU won was in 1956 vs. the Lions.

BYU vs. WCC in 2012

Here are a couple of interesting baseball facts on the WCC (BYU has a 53-59-1 record against that league). Pepperdine won the College World Series in 1992. Of the eight current WCC teams, only St. Mary's has not participated in the NCAA post-season tournament. BYU's 1-1 tie against Pepperdine came in the second game of a doubleheader in 1963. BYU's win-loss baseball records and last action against the current WCC teams is:

About the Team . . .

Major League College Coaches

BYU Coach Vance Law and pitching coach Wally Ritchie are a unique combination, both having played in the Major Leagues. While Law is one of 10 college head coaches who have played in the Majors, none have a Major League pitching coach also on the staff. Ritchie, who pitched with the Phillies in 1987-88 and 1991-92, is one of two pitching coaches in the WCC who have played in the Majors. Portland's Larry Casian pitched for the Twins, Indians, Cubs, Royals and White Sox. Law's father Vernon, who won the 1960 Cy Young Award with the Pirates, was an assistant coach at BYU from 1969-79.

Regarding BYU This Season

- BYU has six players who are married (Chase Frampton, Wes Guenther, Austin Hall, David Parry, Stephen Wells and Alex Wolfe).
- Incorporated into this year's team are four players who have just finished serving two-year Church missions (Adam Law, Adam Miller, Marc Oslund, Brock Whitney).
- Three players transferred to BYU (Mike Milke and Christian Mua are the newest transfers to BYU, joining from previous seasons--Alex Wolfe).
- Among those who could throw batting practice to BYU again this season is former Cy Young winner Vernon Law (1960 Pittsburgh Pirates), father of BYU head coach Vance Law. Vernon turned 82-years-old on March 12, had seven-by-pass heart surgery seven years ago and had his second knee replacement surgery.

Wells' Walk-Off Homers

In 2011 Stephen Wells hit his third walk-off home run of his BYU career. That solo homer came in the 11th inning to give BYU a 4-3 victory over Seattle. In 2010 he had a walk-off, two-run homer in an 11-10 victory at UT-Arlington. As a freshman in 2007 he had a walk-off 10th-inning solo homer vs. Missouri in the Service Academy Classic at Tennessee. Wells' maternal great uncle Allie Reynolds played for Oklahoma A&M from 1936-38 and Oklahoma State's stadium is named after the former N.Y. Yankee great.

VJD's Share Luggage

It's the letter "V", the letter "J", the letter "D" or the letter "T" that's gone wild instead of aces. Head coach Vance Law's father is Vernon, his mother is VaNita, his brothers are Varlin, Veldon, Veryl, Vaughn and sister Valinda. Close behind is BYU rightfielder Jaycob Brugman, whose father is Jayson, mother Jaylene, and siblings Jayna, Jayson, Jayden and Jaymee. Third baseman Dillon Robinson has siblings Darek, Dayna, Deidrey, Danica and Demi. Infielder Tanner Chauncey has siblings Tessa, Tate and Trey.

Home Season

The Cougars entered this season with a 145-80 (.644) record at Larry H. Miller Field which seats 2,204 fans in its 12th season since it was built. In the first nine years BYU drew 218,981 fans for an average of 1,177 and 142,248 at night for an average of 1,452. The crowd of 3,081 against Utah in 2010 was the fourth-largest in school history and the second-largest at Miller Park. The largest crowd at home during 2011 was 1,474 vs. Seattle and the crowd of 2,820 fans at Arizona State was the largest on the road. BYU drew 12,754 fans (averaging 797) for an 11-6 home record. As a prep senior in 2008, Miller was high school teammates with junior Matt Davidson and sophomore Taijuan Walker. Now at Brigham Young, Miller is attracting attention and once again lighting up radar guns.

"He's done a great job and has worked really hard coming off his mission," BYU pitching coach Wally Ritchie said. "He's been sitting 92-93 (mph) and touched 97 against UC Riverside."

His stats this season aren't as impressive. Over three starts, Miller is 1-1, 1.93, but also has 12 walks and 10 strikeouts over 14 innings. But with Miller, context is key. This season is his first season back from a two-year Mormon church mission to Culiacan, Mexico.

Miller, who is being used as the Cougars' third starter, has a hard 12-to-6 curveball and a developing changeup. Harnessing the control will be key for 6-foot, 185-pound righthander.

"His control is still coming back," Ritchie said. "He's still trying to find consistency, but it'll come for him—he's already come a long way since the fall. If you take two years off from pitching, you're going to have some bumps in the road."

Miller said he lost 15 pounds during his mission, but is now back to the 185 pounds he was when he left. He returned to the U.S. in mid-July, but did not start a throwing program until September and didn't get back on a mound until mid-October. Obviously Miller was ecstatic when his velocity came back almost immediately, especially since he wasn't able to play catch at all during his two years in Mexico.

"I only saw one baseball the whole two years I was down there and it was covered in spider webs," Miller said. "Mostly I just saw soccer balls."

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Wells, Black Hole in Centerfield

Playing professional sports is the dream of thousands of children throughout the world. These dreams and visions are no different for BYU centerfielder Stephen Wells.

Visions of hitting a walk-off homerun to win the World Series, catching the game winning touchdown in the Super bowl, or draining a last-second three-point shot to win the NBA finals plays through the minds of every sport-playing athlete.

"As a kid I always wanted to play professional sports," Wells said. "I didn't care which sport, I just wanted to play."

Wells, a 5-foot-11, 186-pound senior from Kenmore, Wash., was self-motivated and played sports year-round in order to improve his skills, but it was through the discipline of setting goals and striving to accomplish them that Wells developed Division I talent. He has a current 10-game hitting streak and ended his freshman season with a 15-game hitting streak. Wells was among the NCAA outfield

For the eighth year, BYU baseball players carry a team coin with them at all times. The coins were given at the annual Christmas party in December.

Players earned the coin through various requirements, such as completing the annual run up to the block Y on nearby Y Mountain last October.

"We are trying to continue the tradition of representing BYU in the right way," said BYU coach Vance Law. "The coin is a reminder of the plus-one motto implying what Vice President (Kevin) Worthen challenged our department to be everything you can be."

One side of the coin reads "competitive greatness" with three "+1" symbols.

"Plus one means going beyond the expected," Law said. "Competitive greatness is one of the elements from coach John Wooden's UCLA Pyramid of Success."

Cougar players also have a challenge opportunity among themselves to develop team unity.

Various U.S. military institutions have similar programs. In the military, each soldier has the opportunity to earn a specially minted coin. The coins are issued by a company's commanding officer and are a very big honor. Each coin is minted specifically for a given unit. Also, each military operation — such as Operation Iraqi Freedom, for example — has its own coin created for the soldiers that participated.

The soldiers are required to always keep their coin with them, and the military has developed an incentive. At any time one soldier can pull his coin on a fellow soldier. If his counterpart does not have his coin at the time the other pulls it, the counterpart has to buy a drink that night. However, if the counterpart can show the coin, he gets the free drink. ...

BYU has developed a similar system. If a player or coach pulls the coin on his teammate (or coach) and the teammate doesn't have the coin, the teammate must buy a soft drink for all of his teammates that have theirs.

The coin is just smaller than the size of the handle end of a baseball bat.

It's a BYU twist on a military tradition. It is a fun way to promote team unity.

leaders with nine assists.

In high school Wells was a standout in both football and baseball. He was voted all-league his sophomore and junior seasons as a defensive back and he lettered three times in baseball. However, because of his size he felt baseball fit him better.

"I always wanted to go to BYU since I was younger," Wells said. "I actually wanted to play football at BYU, but I was better at baseball."

During his junior year of high school, Wells began to get serious about playing collegiate baseball. He played in a summer ball league where he excelled both at the plate and in the field. Due to his successes a few schools began recruiting him. However, BYU was at the top of his interest list.

One break came for Wells through the University of Washington coaches, who knew he was a member of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The Huskies did not want him breaking up playing seasons with a two-year mission, so the UW coaches called BYU and let the coaches there know about Wells and his talent.

Following calls from both the University of Washington and Wells' high school coach, coaches from BYU flew to Portland to watch Wells play in a summer tournament. It was then Wells' childhood dreams began to turn into reality.

"Coach Roberts came and respected my coach's opinion and they offered me a scholarship," Wells said. "I don't think I did that well, but I guess he liked how I played."

Coming to BYU Wells had several personal goals he set for himself. Hitting .400 and making it into the starting lineup were both goals he hoped to accomplish during his first season at BYU. However, when he first arrived, Wells was at the bottom of the depth chart for outfielders.

Through several twists of fate, Wells cracked the starting lineup early in the season and took flight. During his freshman campaign he hit .371 with nine doubles and 11 stolen bases.

He was named to the Mountain West Conference All-Tournament Team, Academic All-MWC, and was Honorable Mention Freshman All-America. It was after his freshman year Wells began to think seriously about his childhood dreams of playing professional sports and serving a mission.

"I always knew I wanted to go on a mission, but I had a really good freshman year," Wells said. "Because of that, people told me to stick around a bit longer to see how I would do.

"If you keep it up you'll have a great chance of being drafted," they said.

Serving a mission is a diffi-

cult decision to make for many LDS college athletes. It becomes an even more difficult decision for collegiate baseball players who have aspirations of playing Major League Baseball. The makeup of professional baseball is different than any other sport. While players are drafted into the NFL and NBA when they reach the ages of 22 or 23, baseball players are often drafted much younger.

Not only is it difficult to compete with players from countries like the Dominican Republic, who start their pro careers so young, but the average age of American players drafted into the MLB is dropping as well. Players like the Los Angeles Angels' Mike Trout and the Washington Nationals' Stephen Strasburg are setting the trend of young players playing in the MLB. The drafting age makes going on a mission a difficult decision, because more is at stake. After a mission great players often never are given the opportunity to play.

One such example of an outstanding player who went on a mission and never quite made it into the big leagues when he got back was Wells' former outfield teammate, Sean McNaughton. McNaughton holds the all-time record for homeruns in the MWC but was not drafted after his senior year at BYU.

"Being a member of the LDS church is what life is all about," McNaughton said. "In your mind you're scared if you leave you're going to lose your skills as a baseball player or somehow lose out on a great opportunity to get drafted and play professional baseball. It's a hard decision and you have to have faith you're making the right decision."

While the odds are against baseball players who serve missions, Wells knew a mission was what God wanted him to do.

"There was always a desire to play a pro sport," Wells said. "When I went on a mission, I knew it would hamper it, especially in baseball. They're always looking for young talent, so when you come back you're 21 and haven't played for a few years it's tough, but after I prayed about it I knew it was the right thing."

During his mission to Puerto Rico, Stephen was able to learn valuable lessons that helped him understand life and baseball. Going out every morning and working hard was nothing new, but it provided him with understanding of how to accomplish what he wanted to in life. Each day he would set goals and strive to accomplish them. When he did not fulfill them, he would try harder the following day.

The lessons learned on his mission have helped him set personal goals for the upcoming season. His BYU coach, Vance Law, has seen

those lessons in practice and knows his goals can become realities.

"Through his example, he motivates people to get better," Law said. "He's putting a lot of hard work and effort in during this offseason. He's working hard in the weight room. That's a telling characteristic. He's an outstanding player."

Wells not only has the confidence of his coach, but of his teammates as well. They see him work and put forth effort and it motivates them to work harder.

"Stephen is one of those guys you want on your team," McNaughton said. "You can trust him with everything. He is one of the hardest working teammates I've ever had and I've never doubted he would give his full effort and sacrifice for the team."

Giving 100 percent effort and putting in countless hours of work, will never guarantee goals will be fulfilled. When asked about his opportunity to play at the next level, Wells can only smile.

"It's somewhat of a long shot now, but I'd love to play there," Wells said. "I'll work hard this year and see what happens. Right now I just want to make it to the College World Series, and see whatever comes after that. If I end up getting drafted that would be a huge plus."

Nevertheless, Wells is not putting all his eggs into one basket. He is studying hard in school, majoring in exercise science. If the MLB does not come calling, he is well situated to provide for his family. He plans on attending pharmacy school once he finishes his degree at BYU. Last December he married Valeria Padgett from Tatumia, Honduras, so the two often speak Spanish in their home.

"I was looking at different grad schools and careers and came across pharmacy," Wells said. "I don't want to be a doctor because I don't like blood, but I like working with and helping people."

Whatever opportunities open, Wells will be prepared. He knows God has been guiding his life. It's not easy juggling school, a marriage, a job and baseball, but Stephen knows what is most important. He does not regret his decision to serve a mission and plans to continue setting goals and working hard throughout the rest of his life.

"He always finds time for what's most important in life," said Stephen's wife Valeria. "He has his priorities set. He sets goals and then works hard to fulfill them."

Highly Touted Prospect Impressive So Far

As BYU baseball coach Vance Law was recruiting outfielder Jaycob Brugman, Law was told that the odds of landing the Arizona high school star were long.

"People told us right from the start that we were wasting our time because Jaycob was too big-time for BYU," Law remembered.

According to some publications, Brugman, who was selected in the 39th round of the baseball draft by the New York Yankees last summer, was the No. 1 prospect coming out of the state of Arizona.

Even Brugman hadn't planned on playing for the Cougars.

"Growing up, I didn't think I would come here," he said.

But he did, thanks in large part to his recruiting trip to Provo.

"I came for a visit here and I kind of fell in love with the atmosphere," Brugman said Wednesday. "The coaches were really nice to me. It felt comfortable."

"I feel like with what we have to offer, if we can get a guy on campus, we have a chance to impress them," Law said. "We got Jaycob to commit to an official visit. He and I had a great visit. I think we talked for 40 minutes or so. Usually those visits take 10 minutes. I thought it went really, really well. A month or so later, he decided this is where he wanted him to go to school. It wasn't until I actually got the letter of intent signed that I realized we were really going to get him. We were very excited because he's a real good player. He's going to get nothing but better, too."

Now, as a freshman, Brugman is hitting .316 (second-best on the team) overall and .400 in conference games. He also shares the team lead in RBIs (33) and has produced a team-high five game-winning RBIs.

Arizona, Oregon, Utah and Arizona State were among the schools that also pursued Brugman. Some questioned why he'd turn down the opportunity to play in the soon-to-be Pac-12.

"There were a few things on the Internet after I committed to BYU," he said. "Word got out and I saw some things people wrote on blogs, about how I was crazy to go to BYU."



"To get a guy that highly touted to come here, I thought it was a good job by our coaching staff and the guys on our team," Law said. "I think he's adjusted very well to college life, and we're looking for huge things from him in the future."

While BYU has had an up-and-down season with a 7-9 record in the Mountain West Conference and a 25-22 mark overall heading into this weekend's series at San Diego State, Brugman is having the time of his life. The 6-foot, 185-pound right fielder from Phoenix's Desert Vista High is doing what he loves.

"It's the best," he said. "It's all a kid could ask for, playing baseball every day."

At the beginning of the season, Law penciled in Brugman hitting ninth in the lineup. He's since moved up to third.

"I figured he would be a middle-of-the-lineup type of guy, but with him coming in as a freshman I didn't want to throw him in there because they pitch the No. 3 hitter different from the No. 9 guy," Law explained. "I wanted to help him get acclimated to the college game before we threw him to the wolves. He's made a real good adjustment to hitting in the middle of the lineup. He's going to get more breaking balls now, especially with guys in scoring position. But he's capable of handling that sort of stuff."

Law said Brugman is one of the best hitters he's recruited to BYU.

"And he's got a chance to be one of those great hitters that has come out of BYU," he said. "He leads the team in RBI as a freshman and for a good part of the year, he was hitting ninth. That tells you that he's a produc-

tive player. He has surprising power for not being a really big guy. But he has such quick hands going through the strike zone with his bat. I think that really helps him drive the baseball to all fields. He's very well-respected among his teammates. He gets along great with the guys. He's really hard on himself. He's a real achiever. He wants to hit every at-bat. He expects huge things from himself, which is a great quality to have. That's going to help him become that much better."

Brugman possesses an unshakable confidence at the plate, no matter the situation.

"I go up there every time thinking I'm going to get a hit," he said. "If there's runners in scoring position, you have to get them in, whatever it takes. In those situations, I feel comfortable and not nervous, which is a good thing. I can concentrate on just getting that runner in."

There's room for improvement, of course.

"At times, and maybe part of it is because he's a freshman, he gets too aggressive early," Law said. "Because he's such a good hitter, and can hit any pitch, he'll swing at balls out of the strike zone at times. As he becomes more disciplined, he'll become that much more dangerous."

One of the underrated elements of Brugman's game is his defense. He has recorded a team-high eight assists.

"He's played a very good right field for us," Law said. "He has an above-average arm. He's throwing guys out. He's doing a tremendous job there. He's one of those guys that has a lot of tools in all areas. That will make him attractive to teams in professional baseball."

Brugman is looking forward to playing in the major leagues someday.

"It's been my goal for my whole life," he said. "Since I was a kid, that's all I've wanted to do."

In the meantime, Brugman will continue to hone his skills — at the plate and in the field — at BYU.
