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
Outlook: "First Rate in '88"

That's one way to describe the 1988 BYU football team. Or, as Coach **LaVell Edwards** told his players at the spring banquet, "We are going to be a good team. Just keep working as hard this summer as you did during the spring—and have the same attitude—and we'll be back on top, where we belong."

Coach Edwards was referring to having to settle for the runner-up spot in the Western Athletic Conference for two years after 10 years of championships and the best record in college football from the mid 70s to the mid 80s.

Two years ago, the Cougars lost a close one (10-3) at San Diego State despite a great defensive effort led by Outland Trophy winner Jason Buck.

Last year was even more of a heartbreaker, despite a good offensive day. Wyoming scored the winning points on a broken play which became a two-point conversion and the Cowboys prevailed, 29-27.

The consensus in the Cougar camp is that second place is not nearly as nice as first—hence, renewed determination to regain the title.

That would mean a Dec. 30 date at the **Sea World Holiday Bowl** in San Diego. In spite of 10 straight bowl appearances, the Cougars haven't been there since beating Michigan for the national championship in 1984.

They also haven't won a bowl game since then so BYU players, coaches and fans are anxious to be "back on top."

The ingredients are in place for a championship year but the bad bounces of the last two years will need a BYU roll to fend off some pesky opposition.

Champion Wyoming returns some outstanding linemen; third-place Air Force has a quarterback (Dee Dowis) who led

the league in rushing and set an NCAA record; and fourthplace Texas-El Paso returns quarterback Pat Hegarty and one of the top runners in league history (John Harvey).

San Diego State has the nation's leading scorer (Paul Hewitt). Hawaii returns the 13th leading scorer (Heikoti Fakava). Colorado State's Scooter Molander figures to provide some headaches for secondary coaches. Utah super sub Scott Mitchell was tops in passing efficiency and now has the job to himself, and Eddie Johnson will scare people if he's anything close to his pre-injury form.

Only winless New Mexico seems hopeless but the Lobos are in great shape to sneak up on some teams whose concentration falters. New Mexico is one of only three teams starting over at quarterback (along with Wyoming and San Diego State) while 13 of the league's top 15 rushers are back and 11 of the top 15 receivers return.

BYU will discover strengths and weaknesses early as it meets Wyoming and UTEP in the first three weeks of the season. However, the Cougars play four of the final five league games on the road.

If BYU does win the league, it will have the equivalent of two bowl games, since the regular season ends Dec. 3 in the Orange Bowl with a nationally televised game against defending national champ Miami.

Two other games are certain on ESPN—Sept. 1 at Wyoming and the Sept. 8 home opener against Texas. CBS is looking at either the San Diego State or Air Force game as a regional telecast.

What viewers will see is a team with the offensive backfield settled instead of brand new like a year ago. And if the offensive line can survive fall camp without the horrendous injuries of last year, BYU, indeed, could be "first rate."

Here's a look at the 1988 Cougars, position by position:

Quarterback: Junior **Sean Covey** passed for 1,668 yards in leading BYU to wins in the last five regular season games. He also threw for 394 yards in the All American Bowl, where he completed 37 of 61 passes.

The backup will be highly regarded freshman **Ty Detmer**, who redshirted a year ago. He had a good spring game to secure the number-two spot over Ralph Martini, who elected to transfer. Bob Jensen decided to forego his senior year and signed with Ottawa of the Canadian League.

Running Back: Injuries and inexperience were the most common descriptions of the backfield a year ago but this time out it might be the most stable position. Everyone's back. The only senior in the group, Mike O'Brien, is questionable due to knee surgery which kept him out of the bowl game.

Fullback **Fred Whittingham** gained nearly 500 yards rushing and caught 35 passes. The hard-working junior will be joined by sophomore tailback **Matt Bellini**, one of the most promising players ever in the BYU program. He caught 51 passes in just over half the season.

Two players who performed well in reserve roles, junior Mike Salido and sophomore Peter Tuipulotu, are the second teamers but figure to get pushed by sophomore Scott Charlton and freshman redshirt Eric Mortensen. Stacey Corley, who missed last season, and squadmen Alema Harrington and Sim Tiatia provide depth.

Another name which could surface soon is Michael Brooks, who played well at Snow College, but was not at

BYU for spring practice.

Wide Receivers: Senior **Chuck Cutler** caught 30 passes, good for 444 yards—mostly in the first half of the season before breaking both thumbs. With David Miles and Rich Zayas gone, the other spot and backup roles are wide open.

Junior **Jeff Frandsen** figures to play a lot as will the other returnee, senior **Garen Jeppesen**, if he recovers from knee surgery. Another senior, **Darren Fortie**, could emerge from the pack. Transfer **Bob Murdock** from Ricks College played

well in the spring game.

A sleeper could be sophomore **Matt Odle**, who has shown flashes of brilliance. With some consistency, he could be a threat. Sophomores **Andy Boyce** and **Kirk Holle**, who both redshirted last year, are other possibilities.

If there are any injury problems, incoming freshmen Kevin

Rita and speedster Tyler Anderson will get a look.

Tight Ends: The Cougars look as solid as anywhere with leading receiver **Darren Handley** (52 catches-636 yards) and **Travis McBeth**, who led the team in yards per catch with 23.

Behind those two seniors are sophomores Chris Smith and Conrad Roberson. Smith played on special teams a year ago but figures to spend some time on offense this fall.

Offensive Line: The most consistent (and non-injured) lineman last year was Brian White, now a senior, but he missed spring practice—as did the other tackle, senior Warren Wheat. White could be one of the league's best, as could Wheat, who played baseball during the spring.

Two other seniors will start. **John Hunter**, 6-8, started games at both tackle and guard last year. **Phil Nauahi** will move from guard to center and Wheat may go from tackle to

guard to make room for Hunter.

Mohammed Elewonibi, a transfer from Snow College, will

fill the other guard spot.

The second team is more of a question mark—so what else is new? Two-time letterman **Don Busenbark** and **Greg Hunter**, a senior coming off surgery on both ankles, will be joined by a bundle of sophomores. Returned missionaries usually redshirt but **Brian May** might be an exception. **Mike Keim**, who redshirted last year after a mission, is 6-8.

Robert Stephens played well at center in the spring.

Deven Coggins, who helped Dixie College to a numberthree national ranking two years in a row, could help and, with **Warren Chow** gone, looks like the heir apparent to the crucial job of deep snapper once held by Todd Christensen.

Guard John Borgia and center Brian Rodoni are the starters gone and Chris Bisho, who played at both spots,


probably won't return to school.

Special Teams: Mike O'Brien returned both punts and kickoffs last year. With his status up in the air, the Cougars used senior Rodney Rice and Matt Bellini as the punt returners in the spring with Mike Salido and frosh redshirt Tony Crutchfield for kickoffs.

Kicking Game: Punter **Pat Thompson**, who was 11th in the nation last year, returns for his senior year and was impressive with his sideline accuracy on short kicks.

Leonard Chitty, with his season and career records for field goals and consecutive extra points, is gone and the place-kicking job will be manned by junior **Jason Chaffetz**.

Incoming freshman **Earl Kauffman** could get a shot at the kickoff duties.

Defensive Line: The returning starter is junior tackle **Craig Patterson**, who weighed nearly 300 pounds at the start of spring practice. Senior **Tim Clark**, who shared time with Patterson last year, will be on the right side.


Behind them are sophomore **Pete Harston**, who was highly recruited before going to Colorado, and junior **Eddie Green**, impressive last year as a linebacker. Another name to consider is **Budd Orr**, who had a great year for Dixie College but wasn't in school for spring practice.

They will try and replace Steve Kaufusi, who didn't get post-season honors but was one of only three players in Utah taken in the NFL draft.

One of the other two was nose guard David Futrell, who played in 53 games—more than any player in collegiate history. Senior **Tim Knight** will man that position with support from redshirt sophomore **Mark Smith** and **Mike Jones**.

Linebackers: With J.C. Von Colln, Thor Salanoa and Richard Hobbs gone, you'd think this would be the rebuilding area for the Cougars. But maybe not.

Junior **Bob Davis** is the only returning starter but three others saw lots of action. Senior **Regan Hansen** apparently

has recovered from a neck injury. They are inside backers while juniors Duane Johnson and Chad Robinson will be on the outside.

Four other players will see lots of action. Junior Alema Fitisemanu played a lot before his mission and junior Marc Neal had a good spring after a redshirt year. Sophomore Ted Dawson really improved during the spring and don't be surprised if Rocky Biegel, the top prep player in Wisconsin last year, pushes the starters this fall.

Defensive Backs: This is either the strongest position on the team or a question mark, depending on how you look at

Gone are cornerback Rodney Thomas (5th round-Miami) and reserve Darrin Lambert (free agent-L.A. Rams). Back for sure on a team that set a school record with 28 pass interceptions are corner Rodney Rice and free safety Scott Peterson, both seniors.

All-WAC strong safety Troy Long should be one of the area's best. But he was bothered by a shoulder problem in the spring. If he plays this fall, the Cougars could be very good in the secondary.

Even without him, there are some excellent athletes but limited experience. Senior Kirk Davis started part-time despite battling Hodgkins Disease. He is determined to play this fall.

Sophomore Brian Mitchell is the other candidate for Thomas' job. Free safety Eric Bergeson, also a transfer from

Snow, played well in the spring. Sophomore strong safety Norm Dixon and freshman corner Tony Crutchfield have good speed but are coming off redshirt years.

Sophomore David Henderson and senior letterman Courtney Rogers also figure in the secondary situation.

Summary: Besides the 28 interceptions, BYU recovered 22 fumbles for an impressive 50 turnovers in 1987. Those stats kept the Cougars in several games.


This year, most of the new faces are on defense so it will have to jell quickly, as BYU faces defending WAC champ

Wyoming on Sept. 1.

Five home games follow but two of those, Bluebonnet Bowl champ Texas and Texas Christian, are with teams which figure to battle for the Southwest Conference crown.

The other two non-WAC games are against Utah State, expected to challenge for the Big West title, and Miami, the defending national champion.

But even with five of the final six games on the road, 1988 has the making of a "first-rate" season.

When LaVell Edwards was named BYU's head football coach in 1972, Cougar football fortunes skyrocketed.

Prior to '72, BYU had averaged less than three wins a year in the school's 47 football seasons. The Cougars could claim only one Western Athletic Conference championship (1965) and had never been to a bowl game.

Since that time, however, BYU has won 146 games, 11 WAC championships (including 10 in a row from 1976-85) and played in 12 bowl games (including 10 in a row from 1978-87). Honors and recognition have rolled in as the football program has risen to national prominence.

Five times in his 16 years as head coach ('72, '79, '80, '83 and '84), the 57-year-old Edwards has been selected WAC Coach-of-the-Year, and five times he has been named Kodak District Eight Coach-of-the-Year ('74, '77, '79, '80 and '84). The post-season games that LaVell has coached in include the Hula Bowl (twice), the Blue-Gray Classic (twice), the East-West Shrine game (three times), the Japan Bowl (twice) and the Coaches' All-America Game.

In January LaVell completed a term as president of the 5,700-member American Football Coaches Association (AFCA). He was the 64th president in the association's history.

In 1984, Edwards led the Cougars to their first-ever football national championship and along the way, picked up NCAA Coach-of-the-Year honors from the American Football Coaches, the Football Writers and the Pigskin Club of Washington, D.C.

Such accolades are justly deserved for one of the great minds in the coaching profession who also is a churchman, husband, father, grandfather, author, teacher and doctor.

LaVell's winning percentage (.747) ranks fifth among the nation's active college coaches. And under Edwards, BYU has averaged over 10 wins a season in the 1980's. In 1986, LaVell passed Frank Kush as the all-time leader in WAC coaching victories.

Having roots in nearby Orem, Utah, LaVell was born and raised not far from BYU's stadium. He graduated from Lincoln High School in Orem and attended Utah State in Logan, where he was a three-year letterman and captain of the football team. Twice he earned all-conference honors at center for the Aggies.


At USU he met his wife-to-be, Patti Covey. LaVell entered the Army, where he played on two service football teams: Fort Lee, Va., in 1952 and Fort Mead, Md., in 1953 as a player-coach with a 6-3 record.

From there, LaVell went into his first full-time coaching job at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached from 1954-61 before joining Hal Mitchell's BYU staff in 1962. Ten years after becoming part of the Cougar staff, Edwards was named head coach Tommy Hudspeth's successor.

The football philosophy practiced by Coach Edwards is one of high-powered offense and rugged defense. Under his guidance, BYU has led the nation in passing eight times ('76, '77, '79, '80, '81, '83, '84 and '85), in total offense five times ('79, '80, '83, '84 and '85) and in scoring ('79).

A 1952 graduate of Utah State, Edwards has added to his academic honors a master's degree from the University of Utah (1960) and an Ed.D. from BYU (1978). His attitude toward education is contagious, and several of his assistants have gone on to attain doctorate degrees.

Edwards has coached more years, won more games and had a better winning percentage than any coach in Cougar football history. His wife, Pat, writes columns for the *Provo Daily Herald*.

(7-4 in 1972; 5-6 in 1973; 7-4-1 in 1974; 6-5 in 1975; 9-2 in 1976; 9-2 in 1977; 9-4 in 1978; 11-1 in 1979; 12-1 in 1980; 11-2 in 1981; 8-4 in 1982; 11-1 in 1983; 13-0 in 1984; 11-3 in 1985; 8-5 in 1986 and 9-4 in 1987) . . . in 1974 he received the coveted Dale Rex Memorial Trophy and was honored as Utah Sportsman of the Year . . . obtained an M.S. degree from the University of Utah in 1960 and an Ed.D. from BYU in 1978 . . . married the former Patti Louise Covey of Big Piney, Wyoming, and they have three children; Ann, now married; John, former member of BYU's track team; and James, a former wide receiver for the Cougars . . . LaVell is one of the best golfers among the nation's football coaches . . . has six grandchildren.

LaVell's Career Highlights

1972 LaVell Edwards, defensive coordinator for the Cougars is named head coach in January . . . a member of the BYU staff since 1962 . . . halfback Pete VanValkenburg wins NCAA rushing title with a 138.6 yards-per-game average . . . the Cougars also lead the league in defense against the rush.

1973 The Cougars begin to move offensively . . . quarterback Gary Sheide is runnerup in NCAA passing and No. 3 in total offense . . . teammate Jay Miller leads the nation in pass receiving (100 receptions for 1,181 yards) . . . Cougars finish second nationally in passing and eighth in total offense . . . Miller sets an NCAA record for most pass receptions (22) in one game (record still stands).

1974 Team ranks high in two NCAA statistical categories; seventh in passing offense, fourth in rushing defense . . . Gary Sheide is runnerup in passing for the second year in a row (behind Steve Bartkowski of California)

... Gary's career completion percentage is fourth on the all-time list ... Bartkowski's final pass completion edged Sheide (182-181) for title. LaVell wins first WAC championship and a trip to the Fiesta Bowl against Oklahoma State.

1975 A year of adjustment, the Cougars falter through the first part of the season, then win six of their last eight games . . . Gifford Nielsen, a sophomore reserve, comes off the bench in the fourth game (New Mexico) to spark a come-from-behind victory . . . Giff sets WAC record with 10-of-12 passing in that game . . . becomes starter thereafter . . . Cougars finish 10th in team passing.

1976 Gifford Nielsen places fourth in NCAA passing (18.8) with only one-tenth completion separating him from Jack Thompson (Washington State) in second place . . . Giff finishes second to Tommy Kramer (Rice) in total offense . . . Cougars finish first in passing, sixth in total offense and eighth in NCAA scoring (424.4 total, 307.8 passing and 31.9 scoring) . . . Nielsen voted first team All-American . . . Cougars tie for WAC championship and play Oklahoma State in the Tangerine Bowl.

1977 Gifford Nielsen unexpectedly exits scene with injury in fourth game (Oregon State) and Marc Wilson takes over . . . by the end of the year, the two have combined for 40 TD passes, 3,585 yards passing and a .605 completion percentage . . . Wilson finishes eighth in passing and third in total offense . . . Cougars lead nation in passing (341.6), finish second in scoring (39.4) and third in total offense (470.2) . . . BYU's 341.6 yards per game is third highest in history, and 41 TDs second . . . Cougars topped the nation in "takeaways" with a total of 56 defensive takes (fumbles recovered or interceptions) . . . Cougars tie for first in WAC and make post-season trip to Japan.

1978 Both Marc Wilson and sophomore quarterback Jim McMahon see action in 10 games as they share quarterback duties . . . Wilson is injured in the third game of the year . . . neither quarterback is mentioned in NCAA stats, but Cougars are eighth in passing and fourth in fumble recoveries . . . Cougars win WAC and play in first Holiday Bowl against Navy.

1979 With two all-conference quarterbacks to choose from, Edwards decides to redshirt McMahon in favor of senior Wilson . . . Cougars upset Texas A&M in season opener and go on to record 11 straight wins . . . Wilson leads the nation in total offense (325.5) and is fourth in pass efficiency (147.1) . . . finishes the year as consensus All-American with 10 NCAA records to his credit . . . Cougars lead the nation in four categories: passing (368.3), total offense (521.4), scoring (40.6) and kickoff returns (26.3) . . . also, the Cougars are 11th in scoring defense (11.4) and sixth in punting (40.1) . . . BYU becomes first division I school to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season . . . LaVell receives the Bobby Dodd coach-of-the-year award . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Indiana in Holiday Bowl II.

1980 The school's first 12-win season . . . also, BYU leads the nation in three statistical categories; total offense (535.0), scoring (46.7) and passing (409.8) . . . Quarterback **Jim McMahon** is named to the Kodak

All-America team along with tackle **Nick Eyre** . . . McMahon is the first Division I player to pass for more than 4,000 yards in a season (4,571) . . . he set or tied 26 NCAA records, most in total offense and passing . . . his pass efficiency (176.9) was the highest ever . . . he also led the nation in total offense (385.6) . . . after losing the first game to New Mexico, BYU wins 12 straight . . . Cougars win WAC again and play SMU in Holiday Bowl III.

1981 Another 11-win season for the Cougars ... have a 17-game win streak and rank eighth in the polls before losing to Nevada-Las Vegas ... BYU leads the nation in passing for the third consecutive year . . . McMahon earns All-America honors and finishes his career with 71 NCAA records (plus the first Davey O'Brien Award) and sets record with all-time high in career pass efficiency (156.9) ... LaVell coaches West team to a victory in the Hula Bowl . . . also coaches in the Japan Bowl . . . Cougars win WAC again and play Washington State in Holiday Bowl IV . . . Edwards' 86-32-1 record ranks among top ten in the nation.

1982 BYU expands Cougar Stadium to 65,000 seats and sells out each game . . . lose home opener to Air Force (39-38) but come back to win seventh straight WAC title and play Ohio State in Holiday Bowl V . . . Gordon Hudson is named consensus All-America . . . BYU finishes third nationally in total offense . . . Steve Young is named WAC offensive player-of-the-year.

1983 Another 11-win season . . . Cougars are ranked No. 7 in final polls, highest ever for a BYU team . . . quarterback Steve Young and tight end Gordon Hudson both named consensus All-Americans . . . after losing to Baylor in the opening game, BYU wins final 11 games . . . once again, BYU leads the nation in passing and total offense and is second in scoring . . . Cougars set NCAA total offense record with 584.2 yards-pergame . . . BYU wins eighth straight WAC title and defeats Missouri in Holiday Bowl VI . . . Edwards surpasses the 100-victory milestone.

1984 Cougars win the National Championship by becoming only the third team in NCAA history to win 13 games in a season . . . win streak is extended to 24 games . . . quarterback Robbie Bosco leads the nation in passing and finishes second to Doug Flutie in pass efficiency (151.8) . . . defensive back Kyle Morrell named first team All-America . . . team leads the nation in passing (346.2) and total offense (486.5) . . . defensively, Cougars finish 10th in scoring defense . . . another WAC championship and victory over Michigan in Holiday Bowl VII . . . Edwards named NCAA coach-of-the-year by most organizations.

1985 Cougars' defense of the National Championship begins with win over Boston College in the Kickoff Classic . . . defensive tackle Jason Buck is named third team All-America and WAC defensive player-of-the-year . . . Mark Bellini earns second-team All-America honors . . . a tie with Air Force for the WAC championship . . . quarterback Robbie Bosco finishes the season ranked second in total offense and seventh in pass efficiency . . . he finishes third in the Heisman Trophy balloting . . . BYU defense ranks 19th against the rush and 18th overall . . . Cougars lose to Ohio State in the Florida Citrus Bowl and end the season ranked 16th in both polls.

1986 Edwards passes Frank Kush as the winningest coach in WAC football history . . . Jason Buck becomes only the third player in the Western United States to win the Outland Trophy and is named consensus All-American . . . Shawn Knight is also named to several All-American teams . . . Lakei Heimuli comes on strong toward the end of the season to break Jeff Blanc's record for career rushing yards . . . Cougars fail to win WAC championship for the first time in 11 years but still post an 8-5 record and play UCLA in the Freedom Bowl.

1987 BYU leads the nation with 50 turnovers (28 interceptions and 22 fumble recoveries) . . . Cougars rebound to ranked ninth nationally in passing offense and 22nd in scoring offense . . . after offensive line is decimated in pre-season camp, Cougars bounce back from 1-2 start to win eight of final nine regular season games . . . young backfield shows promise of things to come in getting within a two-point conversion of another WAC title . . . Cougars win Gridiron Bowl in Melbourne, Australia, but injuries prove costly in All American Bowl loss to Virginia.

Claude Bassett (BYU '78) Inside Linebackers

Claude Bassett is in his sixth year with the Cougar football program. He was named an assistant coach in 1985 after

working as a graduate assistant with

the Cougars for two years.



Prior to coming to BYU for graduate work, Bassett was a coach and teacher at Mountain View High School in Mesa, Ariz. There he worked under Coach Jess Parker and helped the team win the state title twice. He also taught and coached at Pleasant Grove High (1976) and Spanish Fork High (1978) in Utah County.

Born in Reno, Nev., Bassett attended Enterprise High School in Redding, Calif., where he participated in

football and baseball. He also attended Shasta Junior Col-

lege in Redding.

Before transferring to BYU, he served a two-year mission for the LDS Church in Rome, Italy. He is married to the former Leslie Johnson of Orem, and they have four children; Jed, 10; Annette, 8; Camille, 7; and Rebecca, 5.

Norm Chow (Utah '68) Quarterbacks and Receivers

Norm Chow has been an integral part of BYU's successful offense for 12 seasons. He also calls BYU's plays. For several

years, Chow coordinated BYU's recruiting efforts and now directs the graduate assistants.



Previous to joining the BYU coaching staff full time, Chow coached for two years as a graduate assistant. He graduated from Punahou High, Honolulu, Haw., ('64) being named "Athlete

He then attended the University of Utah, where he achieved All-WAC (1967-68) and honorable mention All-America honors as an offensive guard. A career in the Canadian Football

League was cut short after one year when Chow injured his knee. He then became head coach for three years at Hawaii's

Waialua High School.

Chow received a master's degree in special education from the University of Utah and a doctorate in educational psychology from BYU in 1979. He and his wife, Diane, have four children: Carter, 14; Maile, 12; Cameron, 7; and Chandler, 2.

Dick Felt (BYU '58) Asst. Head Coach, Def. Coordinator

After an outstanding college career at BYU and a sevenyear stint in professional football, Dick Felt returned to his



alma mater in 1967 to become a coach. This is his 22nd year on the staff. Felt's current direct responsibilities continue to be with the defensive backs.

Dick lettered in five sports at Lehi High School in Utah and was an allstate football player. He went to BYU where, as a sophomore, he came off the bench in a game with San Jose State to score a record four touchdowns in one quarter. He won all-conference honors as a senior. After graduating in 1958, he played for Bolling Air Force Base (1958-60), where he

earned all-service honors and was named MVP in the Air Force (1960). He was a first lieutenant.

Felt played two seasons with the New York Titans (1960-61), the second year attaining all-pro second-team honors as a defensive back. He was traded to the Boston Patriots and was all-pro in 1962. He played in the first two AFL all-star games. Felt left pro ball in 1966 and came to BYU in 1967.

Dick is married to Dayleen LaVon Hobson of Boise, Idaho, and they have four children: Karen, Curtis (married), Kristie

(August wedding), and Nancy.

Roger French (Minnesota '56) Off. Coordinator, Head Offensive Line

Roger French has been in charge of BYU's offense for the past eight years, during which time the Cougars have tradi-

tionally led the nation in passing and

total offense.



French joined Edwards' staff in 1980 and has since helped produce numerous All-WAC and All-America offensive linemen.

Before coming to BYU, Roger coached at Minnesota and Wisconsin for 14 years. His responsibilities at Minnesota included coaching the offensive line, tight ends and receivers. He was also defensive coordinator and line coach at Wisconsin and Memphis State.

Since French has come to BYU, the Cougars have won the National Championship (1984) and set the NCAA total offense record of 584 yards per game (1983). They also have led the nation in passing and total offense three of the last five years.

Born in Minneapolis, French played linebacker, tight end and fullback at the University of Minnesota, graduating in 1956. He obtained a master's degree and played some pro ball with the Philadelphia Eagles and the Cleveland Browns.

He began coaching at Memphis State, where he was defensive coordinator. In 1962, MSU finished second in the nation defensively. He has coached several All-American linemen in his career, and more than 35 have gone on to play pro ball.

Roger and his wife, Dody, have two daughters, Kathy and

Mel Olson (BYU '70)

Academic Coordinator, Offensive Line

Mel Olson left his mark as a center playing for BYU in the '60s before joining the BYU coaching ranks 19 years ago. He

mainly concentrates on the centers.



He worked closely with Trevor Matich and Bart Oates, former BYU centers who now play in the NFL. He also serves the team as academic coordinator. While coaching the junior varsity several years ago, his teams were undefeated three times.

Born Jan. 20, 1945, in Afton, Wyo., Mel was an all-state fullback and linebacker at Star Valley High for two years (1962–63). He was a member of BYU's first WAC championship team (1965) before accepting a mission call to

Texas (1967–69). Returning to BYU he earned All-WAC and All-America honors his senior year. He was voted to the second team on the 15-year All-WAC football team.

Mel earned his Ed.D. at BYU in 1980, majoring in physical education and minoring in health education. His dissertation was "The Construction and Evaluation of a Coaching Education Curriculum."

He is married to the former Susan Taylor of Provo. They have five children: Michael, 17; Kristen, 15; Melissa, 13; Tresa, 10; and Chad, 6.

Chris Pella (Utah State '66) Recruiting Coordinator, Kicking

Chris Pella joined the BYU coaching fraternity in 1986 after spending 18 years as a coach at Utah State. He was head

coach of the Aggies from 1983-85.



A native of Brigham City, Utah, Pella attended Box Elder High School and Dixie Junior College, where he was team captain and a junior college All-American. He then joined the Utah State Aggies as a fullback, offensive lineman and kicker.

He set a school record with nine PATs in a game vs. New Mexico State. After graduating in 1965, Pella was hired as an assistant coach, a position he held for 15 years under coaches Tony Knap, Chuck Mills, Phil Krueger

and Bruce Snyder.

Over that time, he worked with every position on the team. He also was head wrestling coach for two years. Pella worked for the U.S. Navy in Yokosuka, Japan, as the athletic director and football coach at the Navy base from 1969 to 1972. His 1971 team won the Interservice Championship and played in the Rice Bowl.

He returned to Utah State in the fall of 1972. In 1983 he was named head football coach, replacing Bruce Snyder.

Pella and his wife, Rita, are the parents of three children; Brian, Jake and Nicole.

Tom Ramage (Utah State '57)
Defensive Line, Special Teams

Tom Ramage has, perhaps, the most varied football coaching background in the state of Utah. He joined the BYU staff

16 years ago after coaching in the high school, junior college and major college ranks.

Since Ramage was hired, the Cougars have traditionally ranked high in the WAC in defense against the rush.

Tom came to BYU from Dixie College in St. George, Utah, where he was head coach for two seasons (13-7 overall). He was born in Price, Utah, and enrolled at Utah State, where he won All-Skyline Conference and All-America honors as a tackle in 1956 and lettered in wrestling four years.

He began his coaching career at Bear River, Utah, then returned to USU, where he served as assistant and obtained his M.S. degree (1962). For the next four years, Tom was line

coach of the Aggies under Tony Knap.

He left Logan in 1965 to serve as chief assistant and defensive coordinator at Weber State under Sark Arslanian. In 1971 he took the head job at Dixie College. Sandwiched into his stay at Weber, he served as a commissioned officer in the Army and was discharged as a captain in 1967. Tom has coached two Outland Trophy winners: Merlin Olsen (Utah State) and Jason Buck (BYU).

Tom and his wife, Winona, have six children: John, an assistant coach at Utah State; Lorrie; Rochelle; Sherrie; Dedra; and Cory. Tom also has a grandchild.

Lance Reynolds (BYU '77) Running Backs

For more than a decade, Lance Reynolds has played a key role in BYU's football successes as a player and as a coach.



He joined the BYU staff in 1983 after successful coaching jobs at Ricks College (Rexburg, Ida.) and Snow College (Ephraim, Utah). He was assistant head coach and offensive coordinator at Ricks.

A Salt Lake native, Lance was allstate at Granite High School. He played offensive tackle and guard at BYU before leaving on an LDS mission to Seattle, Wash., after his sophomore year.

When he returned, he earned All-WAC honors at offensive tackle and

played in the East-West Shrine game and the Senior Bowl. He played one season with both the Pittsburgh Steelers and Philadelphia Eagles.

Lance and his wife, Leslie, have five children; Brittany, 11; Lance Jr., 8; Dallas, 4; and Matthew, 2; and Houston, born in March.

Ken Schmidt (Utah '64) Outside Linebackers

Ken Schmidt's name is well recognized in Utah coaching circles. He joined the Cougars in 1982 after a successful high

school and junior college coaching career

A native of Murray, Utah, Schmidt enrolled at the University of Utah, where he was a center and linebacker under Coach Ray Nagel. He was grad-

uated in 1964 and obtained his M.S.

degree from Utah in 1969.



He began his coaching career as an assistant at Granger High School (1964–68). Later, he was named head coach at Skyline High School (Salt Lake City), where his teams posted a 105-24-1 record and won five state

championships during his stay (1968-79).

In 1980, he was named head coach at Ricks College (Rexburg, Ida.). The Vikings won the conference championship both his years there and posted a 17-3 record. In 1981, Ricks defeated Arizona Western 28-21 in the Valley of the Sun Bowl.

Ken and his wife, the former Yvonne Youngberg of Murray, have five children: Ryan, 22 (who will be a redshirt quarter-back at Weber State this year); Craig, 21 (married); Jason, 18; Shauna, 17; and Chad, 10. They have one granddaughter.

BYU's junior varsity program offers experience for incoming recruits and provides an outlet for non-scholarship players to improve their skills.

Some of those walk-on players see varsity action in future years and some of those eventually receive scholarships.

Claude Bassett coordinates the junior varsity program and Norm Chow coordinates the graduate assistant coaches.

Graduate assistants are former players trying to complete their degrees or high school coaches returning to school to complete advanced degrees.

At least four graduate assistants will be involved with the junior varsity program this fall. The head coach is Mark McElroy from Mission Viejo, Calif. Assisting will be Zane Zamenski, Don Allen and Cary Whittingham.

A fifth, Kirk Pendleton, will help Coach Chow with the varsity quarterbacks and receivers. He is a native of Richfield and last played in 1983, when he led the BYU receivers in yardage (810) and touchdowns (11). He was second in scoring behind Lee Johnson.

Zamenski was a quarterback at Holy Cross and has assisted with the junior varsity program for the past three years. Allen, who assisted last year, played at Southern Utah State.

Whittingham was third in defensive statistics in 1985 behind Kurt Gouveia and Jason Buck. A linebacker, he was drafted by Cincinnati and later was on the Los Angeles Rams' roster.



Sea World Holiday Bowl



The Sea World Holiday Bowl is played at the home of the San Diego Chargers.

The Western Athletic Conference champion plays in the Sea World Holiday Bowl at Jack Murphy Stadium in San Diego, Calif.

This year's Holiday Bowl XI takes place at 4:30 p.m. (PST) on Friday, Dec. 30, at the 60,409-seat stadium which hosted the 1988 Super Bowl.

The bowl has been in existence since 1978, when Navy edged BYU, 23-16, in what was then called San Diego Stadium. The name was changed in 1981 to honor the San Diego Union sports editor who had led the campaign to have the stadium constructed in 1967. Murphy died in 1980.

In 1985, the stadium was expanded from 52,675 for football and a \$6.5 million, 300,000 pound Diamond Vision scoreboard was added with a 66 by 100-foot scoreboard and screen for replays.

WAC teams have played in the Holiday Bowl every year except 1985, when Arizona State and Arkansas played.

Since then, the bowl has resumed its tie-in with the WAC and the current contract runs through the 1992 season.

The WAC is 4-5 over the past decade with close games generally prevailing. In the past two years, lowa defeated San Diego State (39-38) and Wyoming (20-19).

The second year (1979), BYU lost to Indiana, 38-37. In the Miracle Bowl of 1980, BYU scored three touchdowns in the final two minutes and 33 seconds to edge Southern Methodist, 46-45.

In 1981, BYU beat Washington State, 38-36, but lost to Ohio State, 47-17, the next year in the bowl's only rout. In 1983, it was BYU 21, Missouri 17, and the Cougars defeated Michigan, 24-17, to win the national championship in 1984.

Even the non-WAC game was a squeaker with Arkansas nipping Arizona State, 18-17.

A major change in the Holiday Bowl came last year, when Sea World became the sponsor and the bowl name was changed to Sea World Holiday Bowl.

Athletic Department

In keeping with the tradition of excellence established by the academic programs and BYU, the Athletic Department has become known around the country for its successes in various sports.

BYU has finished in the top-20 in overall national rankings for 11 of the last 17 years. The Cougars have finished in the top-10 nine times and in the top-five five times. In the Western Athletic Conference, the Cougars have won the all-sports supremacy title 10 straight years.

The University's athletic program boasts 10 NCAA-sanctioned sports: football, basketball, baseball, track, golf, cross country, tennis, gymnastics, swimming and wrestling.

Besides football, the golf (1981) and track (1970) teams have won national championships. Cougar basketball teams have won the NIT twice (1951, 1966) and have been ranked in the top-20 several times. They reached the final eight in the NCAA playoffs in 1981. BYU's baseball team won 19 WAC division titles in 20 years and was ranked as high as No. 1 nationally in 1983.

Part of the success of these teams can be attributed to the fine athletic facilities at BYU. The football team plays its games in the beautiful, 65,000-seat Cougar Stadium. Practices are held on the fields north of the George Albert Smith

Fieldhouse. The practice area incorporates four full-size football fields and other workout stations. The team's locker room and training facilities are located inside the Smith Fieldhouse.

The Fieldhouse contains facilities for nearly every sport. A one-fifth mile rubberized track surrounds three basketball courts, weight rooms and an artificial turf practice area. The west annex of the fieldhouse is used by baseball, football, track and golf teams for indoor practice.


Attendance at BYU basketball games consistently ranks among the best in the nation. Games are played in the spacious 23,000-seat Marriott Center, the second largest oncampus basketball arena in the country. The facility is also used for concerts, forums and other activities.

BYU's track is acclaimed by coaches and athletes as one of the finest in the nation. The NCAA track and field championships will return to BYU May 31–June 3, 1989. All running and field events can be viewed from the grandstand area. An animated, electronic scoreboard entertains fans and keeps athletes current with running times, splits, etc.


The BYU baseball diamond is adjacent to the Marriott Center, the football stadium and the track and field complex. Bleachers provide seating for as many as 4,000 people.

Strength and Conditioning Center



BYU's strength and conditioning center, completed last year, is one of the best in the country.

BYU's conditioning facility ranks among the best in the country.

With nearly 10,000 square feet, the state-of-the-art center features 106 stations enhanced by beautiful blue and gray carpeting and by a stereophonic sound system with 40 speakers.

In short, it's an addition which looks good, sounds good and provides plenty of room for intercollegiate athletes to work out.


Patterned after the best features of weight rooms at other major football powers, the BYU facility is both functional and attractive. Its biggest advantages over previous conditioning areas for BYU athletes are that variety and ample space are provided.

Athletes no longer have to wait around for a certain piece of equipment. They can get more done in much less time than before and do not have to plan their weight training in early morning or late evening to get it all in.

That is especially helpful for athletes of other sports who have had a struggle finding equipment available during football season.

Another plus for the athletes is the motivational factor of getting caught up in conditioning fever by seeing so many others working out at the same time. Cougar athletes who tried the new facility shortly after it opened during the summer raved about how much more fun it was to work on strength and mobility in large, rather than small, groups.

Athletes also have been quick to point out the recruiting benefits of the new facility. They insist the BYU conditioning setup is far better than any they have encountered during visits to other universities. Even coaches of sports where athletes traditionally don't look first at weight rooms feel the new facility will be of benefit. For one thing, it shows BYU is serious about conditioning and, once an athlete is here, he or she will improve by being more involved in weight training.



Cougar Stadium

When BYU expanded its football stadium to 65,000 seats in 1982, it marked the beginning of a new era for the Cougar football program.

In each of its first six seasons, the stadium has been sold out with season tickets. Last year 391,335 fans watched the Cougars play at home, an average of 65,223 per game. BYU has ranked near the top 20 in the country in football attendance every year since the expansion. Arizona State is the only Western school which draws larger crowds than the Cougars.

The fan support has helped BYU schedule home-and-home non-league games with teams like Miami, UCLA, Texas, Penn State and Alabama.

Since its expansion, the facility has been applauded by fans, players and the media as one of the best in the country. Among its many features are a box-bowl configuration, a natural turf playing surface and a four-level press box.

Prior to 1982, the stadium seated 35,000 comfortably, but as many as 47,000 crammed into the facility to see a game. Expansion efforts included lowering the field eight feet, adding end zone seating, constructing the press box and adding box seating in the West stands.

More than 15,000 yards of concrete were used in the expansion effort. Each end zone contains about 4.3 million pounds of steel and seats about 15,000 people.

The playing field has a special sand-based drainage system capable of disposing up to 13 inches of rainfall per hour.

Perhaps the most impressive feature of the stadium is the press box, which runs the entire length of the west stands and rises over 10 stories high. It contains 42 loges (glass enclosed booths capable of seating up to 12 people) on the first two levels. The third level is reserved for working media, and the fourth level is the TV deck. Three elevators transport guests to the press box.

In 1982, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "Outstanding Press Box Working Area."


The single-game attendance record is 65,921, set last year against Wyoming. Cougar Stadium is the 24th largest oncampus football facility in the country and is the fourth largest university-owned stadium in the West (Stanford, California and ASU seat more).



President Jeffrey R. Holland

The eight-year administration of Brigham Young University President Jeffrey R. Holland has been characterized by commitment to excellence and the full realization of human potential.

In his mission statement for the University, Dr. Holland says all instruction, programs and services at BYU, "should make their own contribution toward the balanced development of the total person.

"Such a broadly prepared individual will not only be capable of meeting personal challenge and change but will also bring strength to others in the tasks of home and family life, social relationships, civic duty and service to mankind," he said.

The President considers sports and good sportsmanship as important elements in realizing full human potential. In his own career, he has successfully combined sports, scholarship and leadership responsibilities.

At Dixie High School in his home town of St. George, Utah, he was a student officer, a varsity athlete in football and basketball and a high honor graduate. He went on to become an honors' student at Dixie College where he also served as captain of the school's conference champion basketball team.

After serving a two-year mission in Great Britain for the LDS Church (1960–62), President Holland enrolled at BYU, where he obtained a bachelor's degree in English with highest honors and a master's degree in religious education, graduating with distinction. While at BYU, he was designated an E.S. Hinckley Scholar and was elected to Phi Kappa Phi honor society. More recently, he was honored as a recipient of the University's Distinguished Alumni Service Award.

Dr. Holland obtained a second master's degree and a doctorate in American Studies at Yale University in 1973. He wrote his dissertation on "Mark Twain's Religious Sense: The Viable Years—1835 to 1883."

Preceding his appointment as president of BYU in 1980, Dr. Holland served more than four years as Commissioner of Education for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, with responsibilities for all of the Church's educational programs which reach more than 750,000 students worldwide. Prior to that, he was dean of Religious Instruction at BYU, and he has served as instructor and director at several LDS Institutes of Religion.





A popular speaker and writer, President Holland is noted for his keen sense of humor. He has had more than 50 articles and addresses published in both LDS and professional journals, including "Vital Speeches of the Day."

In the LDS Church, he has been a high councilor, a bishop, and a counselor in three stake presidencies. He also served as director of the Melchizedek Priesthood MIA program and as chairman of the Church's Young Adult Committee. He currently serves as a Regional Representative.

Dr. Holland is on the governing boards of the Deseret News Publishing Company, Commercial Security Bank and Bancorporation in Salt Lake City, and the Polynesian Cultural Center in Laie, Hawaii. He is president of the American Association of Presidents of Independent Colleges and Universities (AAPICU) and is on the board of directors of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities (NAICU).

President Holland is married to his high school sweetheart, the former Patricia Terry of St. George, Utah. They are the parents of three children, Matthew, Mary Alice, and David.



Brigham Young University

Brigham Young University is a private, church-sponsored institution which has earned an admirable reputation for successfully blending scholarly learning with moral and spiritual education.

BYU began modestly in 1875 as Brigham Young Academy with 29 elementary school students. It is now a fully accredited, internationally recognized university with a student body of nearly 27,000, making it the largest private university in the nation in terms of full-time students.

Academic excellence is increasingly evident as students and faculty show their competence. Almost three-quarters of the 1,300 full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees, and the university is accredited by more than 100 education, business, professional and government organizations.

Admission standards for students continue to rise as competition for acceptance increases. The average ACT composite score for entering BYU freshmen is now 23, compared to the national average of 19. BYU graduated four Rhodes Scholars between 1975 and 1978, a record matched only by Harvard, Yale and Princeton. In 1976, it was one of two schools to place three Danforth fellows in a single year.

The J. Reuben Law School, founded just 14 years ago, is establishing a reputation as one of the elite top-40 law schools in the nation, with three of its graduates already selected as clerks to the U.S. Supreme Court.

Other highly respected programs include the School of Management, with it fifth-ranked accountancy department and top-rated MBA program; the computer-aided design/computer-aided manufacturing program, with state-of-the-art computer ability and a reputation for innovation; a large team of researchers in several disciplines studying coal's promise as an alternative to oil; the Ezra Taft Benson Agriculture Food Institute, which is contributing knowledge to help solve the world's food problems.

The music and drama departments are also particularly noteworthy, as are its language programs, with an unusually extensive course offering, and its large number of faculty researching family issues.

BYU is committed to the idea of educating the whole person and has recently devised a new, rigorous general education program in keeping with that commitment. The GE curriculum consists of requirements in basic reading, writing and mathematics, arts and sciences and religion.

To fill the 14 semester hours of religion required, students can take courses ranging from the history of the LDS Church to comparative world religions. Four of the 14 credit hours are spent in study of the Book of Mormon, a text regarded by Mormons as scripture alongside the Bible.


The 631-acre campus is a superb facility. It is unusually clean and well-kept, with beautiful landscaping and spacious quads. The Lee Library, with more than two million volumes and a seating capacity of 4,000, is at the heart of the campus. The Harris Fine Arts Center features five theatres, two art galleries, nine pipe organs, 65 music practice rooms, a National Public Radio station and a Public Broadcasting Service television studio. Laboratories all over campus boast up-to-date equipment and full computerization.

Academic accomplishments and physical facilities aside, many BYU students and faculty point to the character of its people and their commitment to traditional values as the school's most important attributes. Each student signs a Code of Honor, promising to abstain from alcohol, tobacco, tea and coffee and to be honest and chaste—all in accord with tenets of the LDS Church.

Although 98 percent of the student body is Mormon, admission is open to those of any race, color, creed or national origin, provided they meet the university's academic requirements and their conduct conforms to the standards of the LDS Church.

Non-Mormons come from over 25 other denominations, and about 22 percent of the student body is married. Students come from every state (32 percent from Utah) and more than 70 countries. More than 8,000 students are bilingual, having learned a foreign language while serving a mission for the Mormon Church in another country.

BYU is on a three-semester system (4-4-2-2) with fall and winter semesters each being four months long, and the summer semester being divided into spring and summer terms.





Dr. Clayne R. Jensen, Dean and Faculty Representative

Dr. Clayne Jensen is in his 15th year as Dean of the College of Physical Education. which encompasses BYU athletics. A respected and experienced administrator, Dr. Jensen served in the capacity of Profes-Assistant and Dean for seven years becomina before Dean. He has served as BYU Faculty Athletic Representative since 1976 and was chairman of BYU's Advisory Athletics Board for seven years.



Dr. Jensen grew up in Gunnison, Utah. He obtained a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Utah in 1952 and 1956, and his doctorate from Indiana University in 1963.

From 1953–55, he was a captain in the U.S. Marine Corps, and coached two all-Marine championship teams in track and field. He was a faculty member at Utah State (1956–64), member of Phi Kappa Phi, and recipient of the Briethbard Athletic Foundation Award (1955).

He is author or co-author of 16 books currently in print and used in over 700 colleges and universities. He is a member and chairman of several professional boards and special committees dealing with physical education, athletics and related fields. He holds membership in five professional groups and has traveled in 44 states and 26 countries.

He served as a U.S. delegate to the International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece, and he is currently a member of the governing council of the NCAA, and is on the advisory board of the United States Sports Academy.

He has been included in 17 national and international biographies, including Who's Who in America, Who's Who in American Education, Outstanding Educators of America, and Noteworthy Americans.

Dr. Jensen is married to the former Elouise Henrie and they have four sons: Craig, Mike, Blake and Chris (three are former members of BYU's football team).

Dave Schulthess, SID

The University's only sports information director in history begins his final year with the Cougars.

Dave Schulthess came aboard 37 years ago at a time when the size of the student body was relatively small and the school's athletic program very active but modest.

Born in Provo, he attended school in the Los Angeles suburb of Highland Park, where he was drafted into the Armed Services during World War II. Schulthess spent three years in the U.S. Army (Infantry), including two years overseas in the South Pacific.

On his return home, he enrolled at BYU, where he was editor of the campus newspaper, the *Daily Universe*. He graduated in 1950, later working for three newspapers in Salt Lake City: the *Deseret News*, the *Salt Lake Telegram* and the *Salt Lake Tribune*.

In December of 1951 he accepted an appointment to the Public Relations staff at BYU with the specific assignment as sports publicist. Besides sports, his other duties included

editing the school's Alumnus magazine.


An early member of CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America), Dave served as president of the national organization in 1980. He is also a member of CoSIDA's Hall of Fame.

Dave is married to the former Fran Wood of Salt Lake City, and they have four grown children and six grandchildren.



Athletic Director, Associate AD

Glen Tuckett, Athletic Director



Most of the large strides in BYU's athprogram have during Glen Tuckett's tenure as athletic director.

Since he assumed the directorship in July, 1976, the Cougars have claimed 12 athletic supremacy titles in the Western Athletic Conference and consistently have been ranked among the top-10 athletic programs in the country.

In 1985, he was inducted into the Utah

Sports Hall of Fame. He also has been inducted into the BYU Hall of Fame for his successful coaching of the BYU baseball team for 17 years, during which time his teams won 13 division baseball titles, three WAC championships and two NCAA District 7 crowns. Twice his teams went to the College World Series.

In 1983, he was given the Dale Rex award, symbolic of the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah and the highest athletic honor given by BYU.

In 1977 Tuckett was president of the American Association of Baseball Coaches and was inducted into the Collegiate Baseball Hall of Fame in 1979. When he retired, he was the NCAA's ninth winningest baseball coach.

A native of Murray, Utah, Tuckett was an all-around athlete at Murray High School. He played professional baseball for nine seasons, during which time he returned to the University of Utah to obtain a B.S. degree in 1953.

He launched his coaching career at West High School in Salt Lake City, where he worked with the football, basketball and baseball teams. In 1959 he joined the staff at BYU, serving as assistant football coach for six years and head baseball coach for 17 years. He obtained a master's degree from BYU in 1962 and a doctorate in 1978. In addition to his coaching, Tuckett taught health classes and was voted an outstanding teacher at BYU.

Tuckett was chosen as coach of the 1974 United States team which won the World Amateur Baseball Tournament, only the second time a USA team had won in the tourney's 27-year history. He was a color commentator with KSL Radio for 10 years before his athletic director appointment.

Glen serves on a number of NCAA and CFA committees.

A popular public speaker, Glen is often asked to speak to business, public and church groups. He is married to the former Josephine Whittaker of Stockport, England, and they have four daughters: Alison, Shannon, Kendall and Erin.

Pete Witbeck, Associate AD

Associate Athletic Director Alan "Pete" Witbeck has been involved with BYU athletics either as an athlete, as a coach or as an administrator for the past 39 years.

Witbeck, a native of Raymond, Alberta, Canada, came to BYU in 1949 as a long distance runner on the track team. While in Provo, he acquired bachelor's (1952) and master's (1954) degrees and began work on a doctoral degree before joining the P.E. staff in 1955.

Three years later, Witbeck was hired to coach the freshman basketball team, a position he held for six years. During that time, his teams posted a 62-9 record, losing only three times in the last three years Witbeck was coach.

The 1963-64 Kittens were undefeated and ranked first in the nation among freshmen teams. This team went on to win three consecutive conference championships and the National Invitational Tournament in 1966. For his outstanding coaching job, Witbeck was given the prestigious Dale Rex Memorial Award, awarded annually to the person who has contributed most to amateur athletics in the State of Utah. As a member of that NIT championship team, he was later inducted into BYU's Hall of Fame in 1980.

After the successful stint with the freshman program, Witbeck joined the varsity staff in 1962 as Stan Watts' top assistant. His duties included coordinating the offense and heading up scouting and recruiting efforts. During Witbeck's tenure, the team won five out of ten Western Athletic Conference championships and were nationally ranked each of those years. He held that position until Watts retired from basketball in 1972 to become athletic director.

Witbeck also decided to leave basketball and try his hand at athletic administration, a new position as Stan Watts' assistant. After Watts' retirement, Pete continued to work under Glen Tuckett.

Some of his responsibilities include over-

seeing athlete eligibility and game management and serving as liaison between BYU, the NCAA and the Western Athletic

Conference. He is married to the former Kathy Pickering, and they have three children, two daughters and a son who is currently serving in the Oregon Portland Mission.





The Western Athletic Conference reached a high in 1987 when three teams (BYU, Wyoming and Air Force) were invited to bowl games and when the league averaged more than 35,000 fans (35,696) for the first time.

The 1.9 million attendance included four teams (BYU, Hawaii, UTEP and Air Force) which averaged more than 40,000 per game.

The league is the most geographically diverse in the country, spreading from the 7,000-foot heights of Laramie, Wyo., to the sea-level sprawls of Hawaii and San Diego.

Founded July 1, 1962, the charter members included Arizona, Arizona State, Brigham Young, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming. in September, 1967, Colorado State and Texas-El Paso were added to make the WAC an eight-team league.

A major change occurred in July, 1978, when Arizona and Arizona State left for the Pac—10. However, on the same day they departed, San Diego State made its official entry into the conference. Hawaii became the eighth member the following year, and the Air Force Academy entered in 1980.

One of the rewards of WAC membership has been the league's affiliation with the Sea World Holiday Bowl in San Diego. The conference football champion receives an automatic bid to the post-season game against an at-large team.

Based in Denver, Colorado, the WAC has been led since 1980 by Commissioner Joe Kearney. Jeff Hurd is in charge of conference relations. Mark Hollis serves as administrative assistant, and Dee Ann Menzies is legislative assistant.

Outlook

There is no other way to say it—it was a great year for first-year Coach Paul Roach and the Cowboys. After Iosing two of their first three games, the Pokes reeled off nine straight wins before bowing to Iowa, 20-19, in the Sea World Holiday Bowl.

If battles are won in the trenches, Wyoming is the team to beat again in 1988. However, it remains to be seen how well they can replace the skill positions on offensive.

Pat Rabold leads three returning down linemen on defense and Mitchell Donahue had an excellent freshman year. Mike Schenbeck is the returning linebacker.

Wyoming is high on its secondary, despite two losses.

The key for the Cowboys will be at quarterback, where redshirts Randy Welniak and Bobby Fresques will battle last year's number three man, Bryan Mooney.

Series Notes

Cougar fans will have a hard time forgetting last year's 29-27 Homecoming loss to the Cowboys.

After BYU took a 14-0 halftime lead, Wyoming scored four touchdowns in just over one guarter. BYU roared back with two scores but it wasn't quite enough.

Ironically, the winning points came on a bobbled PAT snap. forcing Wyoming to throw a desperation pass which was good. BYU tried an intentional two-point pass midway through the fourth quarter but it was incomplete.

Another bitter loss was in 1976, when Wyoming Coach Fred Akers devised a quarterback draw play which kept the Cougars off balance and resulted in a 34-29 victory, sending the Cowboys to the Fiesta Bowl.

Prior to last year, BYU had won five in a row and nine of the last 10. A key game in BYU national championship year (1984) was coming from behind to beat Wyoming, 41-38.

Outlook

Texas has 15 starters and 53 lettermen back from the team which finished second in the Southwest Conference and beat Pittsburgh, 32-27, in the Bluebonnet Bowl.

The big play man is tailback/return specialist Eric Metcalf. The 5-9 senior was the NCAA long jump champion a year ago and is the son of former St. Louis Cardinal great Terry Metcalf.

He returns in the backfield with Darron Norris but the quarterback, Bret Stafford, doesn't. Seldom-used Shannon Kelley, a senior, will get the nod and his progress will determine the Longhorns' success because there is a great supporting cast.

Only one lineman is gone from the offense and one from the defense. However, three of the four defensive backs graduated. Stanley Richard and Fred Stromile alternated at right cornerback but the latter spent the spring at a junior college to work on his grades. Six other Longhorns were in that same situation.

Punter Alex Waits is back along with kicker Wayne Clements, snapper Tal Elliott and holder Rob McManis.

Texas is still rebuilding under the McWilliams system. They may still be a year away (there are only 18 seniors listed on the 109-man roster).

But he has depth at most positions he didn't have last year. If Texas can avoid some of the injuries which plagued it early last year, this will be an excellent team.

Series Notes

BYU's defense picked off four interceptions and grabbed four fumbles last year for a 22-17 victory in Austin.

But the Longhorns bounced back to win seven of their last 10.

The Longhorns were consensus national champions in 1963 and 1969. They were UPI's national champion in 1970.

BYU is 4-3 against teams from the Southwest Conference and 25-12-1 against teams from the state of Texas.

Games this year with Texas and TCU end regular-season play with Southwest Conference schools for awhile. However, the Cougars will continue playing Texas-El Paso in WAC action.

Outlook

Last year's UTEP media guide was called "Miner Magic." It was a misnomer—there was no magic involved, just good coaching and good players who combined for a 7-4 season.

It was the Miners' first winning season since 1970 and the bad thing for the rest of the league is the fact 35 of last year's

top 44 players return.

UTEP was 7-2 before season-ending losses to BYU and Wyoming when quarterback Pat Hegarty was sidelined with a broken jaw. He had passes for 2,064 yards and 13 touchdowns to become the WAC Newcomer of the Year.

If there is an offensive flaw this year, it is that the wideouts (Harold Collins and Barry Parker) are gone. But tight end

Arnie Adkison, who also punts, is back.

The strength is that running back John Harvey has another year left. He was fifth nationally in scoring and second in the WAC in rushing (1,170 yards). He now has 2,812 career yards. Harvey also has 83 career catches for more than 600 yards.

Fullback Eddie Dixon and both backups return. Four of the five down linemen are back, led by all-WAC center James

Spady and second-team guard Robert Pufahl.

All four defensive back return from the only team to hold opponents to less than a 50 percent completion rate (48.5). The Miners also gave up the fewest touchdown passes (10). The leader is safety Terry Walker, a second-team WAC choice.

Linebacker Doug Morgan, a former walkon, led the Miners in defensive stats and could be one of the league's best. Up front is the only question mark as only end Tony Tolbert and tackle Ross Puritty are back.

UTEP was third in the WAC in total defense. If they can successfully replace those three down linemen, watch out.

The Miners have to play BYU and Wyoming on the road. Their conference opener is Sept. 17 in Provo. So BYU will know early what to expect in 1988.

Series Notes

BYU holds a modest two-game winning streak after winning 14 straight between 1971 and 1984.

The BYU-UTEP series started in 1946, the two teams met again in 1948 and 1949 and then the rivalry was discontinued until 1964. BYU holds an 19-6-1 advantage in the matchup.

Miner victories came in 1948, 1949, 1967, 1968, 1970 and 1985. The two teams tied in 1964.

Outlook

Utah State won five of its final six games to end the season at 5-6 and place second (4-3) in the Pacific Coast Athletic Association.

Now in his third season, Coach Shelton thinks the Aggies could be a championship contender.

The optimism centers around quarterback Brent Snyder, who broke several Aggie school records while passing for 2,887 yards and is second among the returnees nationally in total offense.

Second among returning receivers nationally is All-America candidate Kendal Smith, who averaged more than six catches a game and returned punts and kickoffs.

The Aggies return only 28 lettermen but 14 of those were starters—seven each way—and there are 21 redshirts and seven transfers.

It is the offense which should be very good for the Aggies. Besides Smith, Snyder has Pat Newman to throw to. Reserve Monte Ahlemeyer and transfer Keith Roberson will battle for the tight end spot.

Brett Payne returns at running back and transfer Steve Beutler and freshman Todd Richardson will get a look at fullback. Center Sid Roberts and guards Jerry Brown and David Walker form the nucleus of what could be a good offensive line.

To win consistently, the Aggies need defensive improvement and are counting on tackle Brian Hunsaker overcoming a knee problem. Younger brother, Jeff, also should help the front line.

Kevin Bouwman leads an adequate group of linebackers but USU has question marks in the secondary. Greg Haynes looks like a sure starter but the Aggies are counting on transfer Emmett Bonamarte and frosh recruits.

Punter Louis Aguiar returns and Dene Garner's place-kicking duties go to Russ Moody, who played at Dixie two years ago.

Series Notes

The Snyder-Smith combination gave the Cougars something to think about for 1988 when they combined for a USU touchdown after BYU had scored with 39 seconds left.

Smith returned the kickoff 34 yards to the Aggies' 41 yardline. Snyder then threw passes of 12, 14 and 33 yards to Smith for a touchdown as time ran out.

BYU had taken a 38-12 lead midway through the fourth quarter but the Aggies scored twice in the final four minutes to make the final score, 45-24.

The Cougar-Aggie series dates back to 1922, when BYU officially began playing football. Utah State dominated early on, and the Aggies still hold a four-game lead in the series.

If everyone recovers from injuries, the Rams will have eight defensive starters back, led by three-year letterman and All-WAC free safety Ron Cortell.

The offense has a lot of holes to fill but one of them is not at quarterback, where Scooter Molander had the second highest single season passing total in CSU history with 3,168 yards.

Add second-team halfback Scott Whitehouse, who rushed for 812 yards, and the Rams have two good ones to build around. Fullback Todd Yert (413 yards) also returns.

Coach Fuller and his staff spent the spring looking at linemen and receivers. Guards Ben Morgon and John Laurita return but the receiving corps was decimated.

An unknown for the Rams is a large number of players on both sides of the ball coming off injuries. Their production could help CSU bounce back from its disappointing 1-11 season.

On defense, Cortell led the team in tackles and ranks fifth on the school's all-time interception list. Two-year starter Dave Mundt is the top name among three returning linebackers.

Nose tackle Greg Baker is the man to watch up front and the Rams could be tough on defense if corner Kevin Nettles and strong safety Sean Jackson are at full strength.

The Rams are still young on paper but they played a lot of freshman last year. Whether that experience pays off this year will determine CSU's success in having a winning season.

Series Notes

Fuller is second in seniority after LaVell Edwards in the WAC and had the Rams on a steady course until last year's injury-riddled 1-11 season.

Even so, CSU came within four points of BYU in the Gridiron Bowl at Melbourne. Molander passed for 317 yards in that 30-26 defeat to give the Cougars an idea what he can do

Two years ago, CSU knocked the Cougars out of a tie for the WAC title with a 24-20 shocker. Before that, BYU had won 10 in a row, most by lopsided scores.

The two schools have played 50 times going back to the Colorado A&M days with BYU holding a slim 24-23-3 edge over the Aggies/Rams.



Outlook

If BYU fans thought TCU made the Cougars look bad a year ago, watch out for 1988.

TCU has a senior (31) dominated team with many of the same players who helped the Frogs finish with the best total offense and third-best defense in the Southwest Conference.

The Frogs' 5-6 record is deceiving because they lost in November by a point to Texas Tech and by three to Texas. Back are 15 starters plus the all-conference punter (Chris Becker) and a place kicker who is a three-year letterman (Lee Newman).

This may be the year TCU challenges Texas A&M for the Cotton Bowl—there is that kind of talent and depth, even with the loss of center Clint Hailey and star halfback Tony Jeffery the career rushing leader with 3,749.

Quarterback David Rascoe, who drove BYU crazy, will be pitching to fullback Scott Bednarski and to halfbacks Bobby Davis, Tony Darthard and transfer Cedric Jackson.

Both split end Reggie Davis and tight end Ricky Stone are three-year lettermen. Also back are guards Mike Sullivan and Rob Adams and tackle Jeff Hopkins.

On defense, leading tackler Floyd Terrell and standout tackle Kent Tramel are gone but look out for free safety Falanda Newton and tackle Mitchell Benson.

Newton was named a second-team All-America by The Sporting News and Benson was second-team all-league. End Tracy Simien, a former offensive starter, should have a big senior year.

Series Notes

The Cougars and Horned Frogs met for the first time last year with TCU clobbering BYU, 33-12, as Jeffery gained 207 yards and Rascoe 105.

Last year's game featured a large influx of crickets, covering the field and the lights at Amon G. Carter Stadium. A crowd (22,615) which only half filled the stadium watched reserve quarterback Sean Covey play in his first varsity game in four years and he responded with 157 yards passing.

Outlook

All-WAC running back Heikoti Fakava led the nation in scoring part of last year before finishing 13th with 102 points. He rushed for 792 yards and caught 17 passes.

At midseason in Coach Wagner's first year, the Rainbows were in the driver's seat in the WAC—only to drop five of their last six to slump to sixth in the WAC and 5-7 overall.

A consistent quarterback will help. Three started last year and all are back. Warren Jones completed 56 percent of his passes for 1,326 yards but the nod could go to sophomore Garrett Gabriel, who threw for 715 yards late in the season.

Up front is second-team All-WAC pick Amosa Amosa, moving from guard to tackle for 1988. Tackle Theo Adams and guard Larry Jones also return although if there is enough depth, Adams might move to defense. Chris Gaskill is back at wide receiver and the team's leading receiver, slotback Dane McArthur, returns.

For the first time in years, it is defense where the Rainbows look vulnerable. If All-America tackle Al Noga were the only loss, it wouldn't be so bad. But he's not. There will be new faces at most positions.

Coach Wagner had one of the country's top defenses when he coordinated that area as an assistant. All his expertise will be needed this time around.

Linebacker Mark Odom is the honors' candidate and will move from outside to inside backer to try and plug some holes. Some redshirts and junior college players will be counted on heavily to bolster the Hawaii defense.

In the secondary, former quarterback Walter Briggs is being tried at free safety (the secondary lost all four starters).

Series Notes

Hawaii won four of the first five games but since then BYU has won nine in a row for a 10-4 series lead. The Rainbows last won, 15-13, in 1974.

BYU is 8-0 since Hawaii joined the WAC. Last year was proclaimed "the year" for the Rainbows and it nearly happened. The Cougars' offense sputtered but the defense had a tremendous second half to preserve a 16-14 victory.

Outlook

To say former BYU graduate assistant Mike Sheppard had a long first year at New Mexico is an understatement.

The Lobos lost by only four at Utah, three at New Mexico State and 11 at Arizona. Then the roof fell in and UNM yielded

48 points per game in breezing to an 0-11 record.

You could be cynical and say it's a good thing most of the defense is gone from a team that finished 104th among NCAA schools. But most of the offense is gone from a team which was eighth nationally.

Unfortunately for WAC fans, superstar Terance Mathis apparently is an academic casualty and might not be able to play this fall. He was fourth in the nation in all-purpose running, fifth in receiving and 20th in kickoff returns.

Two other receivers do return—tight end John Duff caught 51 passes for 701 yards and Al Owens grabbed 27.

But who will get them the ball? Barry Garrison, third nationally in total offense, is gone. The prospects are backup Duffy Daugherty and redshirts Ed Larson and Jonathan Mitchell.

Guard Sam Taylor and tackle Dave Mequet are starters on the offensive line but the Lobos have others who saw lots of action last year due to injuries.

The Lobos, last in the league in rushing with only 67.2 yards, are hoping transfer Andrew Wooten can help in that area. What would really help is not being so far behind that they have to throw so much.

Nose guard John Bell, linebacker Steve Webster and free safety Brett Heber form the nucleus of the defense, which must improve for New Mexico to have a chance to win.

Series Notes

In 1964, New Mexico ruined BYU's inaugural appearance in Cougar Stadium, winning 26-14.

A year later, BYU clinched its first-ever WAC championship with a win over the Lobos 42-8.

In 1973, Jay Miller set an NCAA record that still stands with 22 receptions against New Mexico in a 56-21 romp.

In 1980, BYU lost its season opener in New Mexico's University Stadium 25-21 as Jim McMahon was frustrated by a fierce Lobo blitz. It was to be the Cougars' only loss.

The 1985 game was also a classic in the BYU-UNM mold. A Lobo missed extra point and two late BYU touchdown drives resulted in a tense 31-30 victory for the Cougars.

Last year, BYU gained 556 yards with Bob Jensen running for two scores and passing for two in a 45-25 rout. Two of the Lobos three touchdowns came late in the game.

Outlook

Coach Denny Stolz has seen both the highs and the lows during his two years with the Aztecs. In 1986 he surprised the WAC by going 8-3 to win the league title.

Then last year his team lost six of its first seven games.

Which SDSU team will emerge in 1988 is the question. Most of the defense is back but it was weak a year ago. Most of the skill people are back on offense but quarterback Todd Santos and his NCAA record 11,425 passing yards are gone.

The new quarterback will be have a name like Scott Barrick or Brad Platt, although reserve Jack Skoog returns. Barrick, a former California prep athlete of the year (Fallbrook), redshirted and will be a freshman. Platt was a California junior college all-stater (Southwestern).

They will try and get the ball to Alfred Jackson and Monty Gilbreath, also an All-WAC return specialist. Second-team

All-WAC Kerry Reed-Martin returns at tight end.

When they don't throw, the Aztecs will hand off to Paul Hewitt, the nation's leading scorer last year with 144 points. He also caught 42 passes for 378 yards.

On the line, center Kevin Wells is a two-year starter, and guard Roman Fortin could be one of the league's best.

The Aztecs will switch to a three-man front as they try to improve a defense which yielded a league-high 54 touchdowns a year ago. The standout is cornerback Mario Mitchell. who returns along with free safety Lyndon Earley.

Series Notes

The Aztecs won, 10-3, two years ago to stop BYU's string of 10 straight WAC titles won or shared.

Last year in Provo, BYU's reserves were unable to get a first down while trying to run out the clock and Santos returned in the final minutes to break what was then the NCAA career yardage record of 10,623 yards held by Fresno State's Kevin Sweeney (1982-86).

Gone are the WAC's second straight Outland Trophy winner (BYU's Jason Buck was the first in 1986) Chad Hennings, All-WAC linebacker Rip Burgwald and second-team nose auard John Steed.

But, while defense is a question mark, look out for the Air Force offense with junior quarterback Dee Dowis, the top six halfbacks and Coach DeBerry intent on improving the pass-

Dowis earned a start in the Falcons' second game and he led them to a 9-2 record in games he started. The broken wrist, which caused him to miss the Freedom Bowl, has healed.

He set an NCAA record with 1,315 yards rushing, averag-

ing 6.8 yards per carry.

Fullback Quinton Roberts is gone but Andy Smith, who started five games and became the team's second leading rusher, is back. Halfbacks Anthony Roberson and Albert Booker combined for more than 1,000 yards. Roberson scored 10 touchdowns and averaged 22.8 yards per kickoff

Air Force must replace wide receiver Tyler Barth and tight end Frank Martini but has good talent in Mark Crossman and Greg Cochran.

Tackles Jim Payne and Jeff Johnson are back and DeBerry thinks guard David Hlatky will be one of the area's best.

Outside linebacker Kevin Hughes, hampered at times last season with a knee injury, leads the defense. Others to watch are cornerback Gary Kilmer, who had 71 tackles, and free safety Mario Mathis, who had 60.

Series Notes

BYU has won nine of the 10 meetings and five straight. Air Force notched its only win in 1982, when the Falcons upended the Cougars, 39-38, in the first game played at the expanded stadium.

Air Force has been to bowl games in five of the last six years, missing only 1986, when the Falcons lost to BYU, 23-3, in Bob Jensen's first start.

Outlook

Utah was third nationally in passing a year ago and 12th in total offense and it looks like another good year.

The spotlight centers on sophomore quarterback Scott Mitchell, third in the WAC and 15th nationally in passing efficiency despite his non-starting role.

The 6-6 lefthander had only four interceptions in 188 attempts as he threw for 1,448 yards and nine touchdowns, including three come-from-behind wins.

He'll throw to wide receivers Carl Harry and Aaron Grimm and to tight end Dennis Smith. The running will be handled by Eddie Johnson and Martel Black, if both are available.

Johnson gained 1,046 yards in 1986 before injuring a knee in the second game last year. As a freshman in 1984 he gained 1,021—earning All-WAC honors both years.

Black left the team in the spring but apparently has decided to play again. He led the Utes with 520 yards last year.

The defensive line should be better with James Thompson and James McKenna back while Frank Bonifacio and Garland Harris lead the linebackers.

The WAC's interception leader, Eric Jacobsen, joins Sean Knox and Greg Smith as returning starters in the secondary.

The defense should be respectable after several years near the bottom of the NCAA statistics and the Utes should improve on their 2-6 WAC finish (seventh place).

The offensive tools are there for a run at the title but past defensive performance still leaves some questions marks.

Series Notes

What was one of the most lopsided series in college football 20 years ago has started to even out. The Utes still command a whopping 39-20-4 lead, but the Cougars have won nine in a row and 15 of the 16 games played between the schools since LaVell Edwards has been BYU's head coach.

But if anyone can attest to the Utes' potential, it's BYU. Utah threw a big scare into the Cougars last year, playing them on even terms before falling, 21-18.

It took a 40-yard run by quarterback Bob Jensen to set up the winning field goal in the fourth quarter. Starter Sean Covey had gone out at the end of the third quarter with a concussion.

Outlook

Fortunately for Miami's opponents, the Hurricanes can't possibly do any better than last year when they went 12-0, defeating Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl.

And there are a lot of inexperienced players who haven't seen much action during the 23-1 span of the last two years (33-3 over three years). Miami obviously sees that record as a plus with the winning tradition and excellent recruiting.

On the "yes, they are really human" side, Miami lost 13 starters and both kickers, including such standouts as receivers Brian Blades and Michael Irvin, fullback Melvin Bratton, defensive back Bennie Blades and linebacker George Mira.

The areas hardest hit by graduation were the receivers and the secondary. Strengths are the front seven on defense and

the return of guarterback Steve Walsh.

Following in the tradition of Vinny Testaverde, Bernie Kosar and Jim Kelly, Walsh-then a sophomore-led Miami to 12 straight wins last year. Now a junior, he threw for 2,249 yards with 19 touchdowns and only seven interceptions.

The defensive line is not as big and physical as in recent years but is quick and there are experienced linebackers. Names to keep in mind are tackles Jimmie Jones and Greg Mark, end Bill Hawkins, and linebackers Rod Carter and Randy Shannon.

Running backs probably will be Leonard Conley, the 5-9 speedster who had the backup job a year ago as a freshman, and senior fullback Cleveland Gary, who transferred from Georgia after his first year.

Those two combined for 12 touchdowns, not much shy of the 17 by starters Bratton and Warren Williams.

Mike Sullivan leads the offensive line. He started at left tackle as a freshman and played at center in the spring but will probably start at left guard.

There are talented corners in Bubba McDowell and Donald Ellis. And even though the safeties and receivers will be new,

there is a lot of talent to use.

Series Notes

BYU has never played the Florida schools in football. The Cougars have been in Orlando twice and lost both times.

They were edged by Ohio State, 10-7, in the 1985 Florida Citrus Bowl and were smashed by Oklahoma State, 49-21, in 1976 at what was then called the Tangerine Bowl.

All in all, going to the Southeast hasn't been too successful for the Cougars. In 1975, they lost to Southern Mississippi, 42-14, in a game played at Jackson. Georgia nipped BYU, 17-14, on a last-minute field goal in 1982 and Virginia edged the Cougars, 22-16, last year at Birmingham.

When Coach Johnson was an assistant at Iowa State in 1968 and 1969, the Cyclones beat the Cougars, 28-20 and



Sept. 2, 1987—evening game (85 degrees, partly cloudy) in Cougar Stadium (64,274).

The Cougars opened the 1987 season with a bang, but ended the game disappointed with a loss to 20th ranked Pittsburgh before a national ESPN television audience. BYU quarterback Bob Jensen connected with wide receiver Rich Zayas on the first play from scrimmage for a 73-yard touchdown. However, the aggressive Pitt defense rallied to shut down the Cougar offense and establish excellent field position for the Panther offense. Behind the powerful legs of 260-pound fullback Craig Heyward, Pitt built a 20-point advantage. The Cougars staged a fourth quarter rally, but could not overcome the 20-point deficit. Despite being sacked eight times, Jensen scrambled to throw for 317 yards and two touchdowns. Making his debut in a Cougar uniform, halfback Matt Bellini was impressive catching four passes for 47 yards in the first half before being sidelined with a knee injury. BYU now 0-1.



Historical View

Being recognized as one of the country's top programs—not to mention winning a national championship—seemed out of the realm of possibility for the Provo, Utah, school. After all, it was little more than 20 years ago that the Cougars won their first Western Athletic Conference football title. And the team had managed only 171 victories and 16 winning seasons before the 1972 season.

It was in 1972, however, that BYU's football program shifted gears. LaVell Edwards was named head coach in that year, and things have not been the same since. The Cougars have won 146 games and been to 12 bowl games. Eleven times BYU has won the WAC title under Edwards' direction, including 10 in a row from 1976–85. And the Cougars won the national championship in 1984.

Things weren't always so rosy in BYU's program, however. Football got its beginning at BYU in 1922. That first season, BYU won only one game and scored a total of 10 points during the season. Now, BYU is traditionally one of the nation's


leaders in scoring and offense.

Football was introducted at BYU near the beginning of the century, but a fatality prompted its discontinuance. The game returned in 1922 and, minus three years during World Ward II, the Cougars have played 63 seasons. BYU initially joined ranks with the old Rocky Mountain Conference and later became part of the Mountain States, Skyline and Western Athletic Conferences.

Some of the more noted athletes who have helped propel BYU into the national limelight have been quarterbacks. Virgil Carter (1966), Gary Sheide (1974), Gifford Nielsen (1976), Marc Wilson (1979), Jim McMahon (1981), Steve Young (1983), and Robbie Bosco (1985) have all left their mark on BYU's record books. Nielsen, Wilson, McMahon, Young and Bosco were named All-American quarterbacks, and each erased marks set by his predecessor. McMahon, Wilson and Bosco were third-place finishers in the Heisman Trophy balloting, while Steve Young finished second. Both McMahon and Young were recipients of the Davey O'Brien Award, given to the outstanding collegiate quarterback.

While passing has been the name of the game at BYU since Edwards took over, there also have been some impressive running backs. Eldon "The Phantom" Fortie (1961–62), a single-wing back, won All-America honors in 1962. "Fleet Pete" VanValkenburg (1970–71), led the nation rushing his senior year and was second-team All-America. Fullback John Ogden (1964–66) was the leading rusher in the WAC for three consecutive years. And fullback Todd Christensen (1975–77) did such a good job running with and catching the football he later became an all-pro tight end. He was the leading receiver on BYU's team for three years. Lakei Heimuli (1983–86) is the school's career rushing leader.

A good passing team must have good personnel on the offensive line, and BYU has had its share of honors recipients in that area. Gordon Gravelle (1970), Paul Howard (1972), Brad Oates (1973–75), Orrin Olsen (1972–75), Tom Bell (1974–79), Nick Eyre (1977–80), Bart Oates (1977–82), and Trevor Matich (1979–84) are just a few standouts.

There also have been several outstanding tight ends at BYU, most recently **Clay Brown** (1978–80), **Gordon Hudson** (1979–83), **David Mills** (1980–84) and **Trevor Molini** (1985–86).

Top defensive players include Wayne Baker (1972–74), Paul Linford (1972–74), Mekeli leremia (1975–77), Glen Titensor (1978–80), Glen Redd (1976–80), Kyle Whittingham (1979–81), Todd Shell (1980–83), Kyle Morrell (1980–84) and Jason Buck (1985–86). Buck, the 1986 recipient of the Outland Trophy, was only the third player in the western United States to win the award.

At various times in the last 15 years, the Cougars have had some great return specialists. **Chris Farasopoulos** (1968–70), the Galloping Greek, led the nation in punt returns and set two NCAA records. **Golden Richards** (1970–71) is still listed as a holder of several NCAA records. **Vai Sikahema** (1980–85) set an NCAA record for the most punt returns and later earned all-pro status with the St. Louis Cardinals.



Leonard Chitty set career records for PATs and field goals.





Cougar Bowl History

All American Bowl, 1987

Virginia 22, BYU 16 December 22 Birmingham



The 11th annual All American Bowl was cool (temperature in the high 40s after two days of rain) and the Cougars never got warmed

up despite taking a 3-0 lead.

BYU's 10th consecutive bowl appearance saw several records set but the Cougars were edged, 22-16, in their initial game with Virginia. Sean Covey attempted 61 passes, David Miles had 188 vards in receptions and Pat Thompson only had to punt once-all bowl records—but the Cougars fell just short several times.

Covey, who had led the Cougars to five straight wins as a starter, thought he had a first down at the BYU 46 with four minutes remaining but the ball was marked just short on a fourth-down play.

Darren Handley, BYU's leading receiver for the season, dropped a touchdown pass in the first quarter before BYU settled for a 20-yard field goal by Leonard Chitty. However, Chitty, who set a season mark for field goals (18) and consecutive PATs (29), missed 51 and 47-yarders in the second quarter as the Cavaliers took a 14-3

BYU got to the Virginia two-yard line midway through the third quarter only to have a fourth-down pass tipped at the last second. Kyle Whittingham scampered eight yards to cut the lead to 14-9 at

the end of third quarter.

Virginia, behind quarterback Scott Secules, the game MVP, made a crucial 76-yard drive to go ahead, 22-9, with 11 minutes left. BYU then went the same distance to score on a one-yard pass to Whit-

tingham with seven minutes remaining.

The Cougars were hurt by the absence of running back/returner Mike O'Brien and linebacker Thor Salanoa, who both suffered knee injuries in the Australia game. Salanoa's loss was magnified when linebacker Richard Hobbs was sidelined in the first half of the bowl game.

Ironically, nine years earlier on the same date (his anniversary), Virginia Coach George Welsh had led his Navy team to a 23-16 win over BYU in the inaugural Holiday Bowl.

Freedom Bowl III, 1986

UCLA 31, BYU 10 December 30 Anaheim



Although BYU failed to win the WAC title, the Cougars kept alive an impressive streak of nine bowl appearances in a row by being invited to the third annual Freedom Bowl. There they met familiar foes UCLA and Gaston Green.

The two teams had met in 1985 when the Bruins came from behind to win a closely contested struggle in Provo, 27-24. Green,

UCLA's outstanding tailback, was limited to 59 yards in that game and much of UCLA's offense came as a result of John Lee's four field

The Freedom Bowl, however, proved different as UCLA and Green broke open a close game in the third quarter and went on to win 31-10.

The first half was marked by defensive struggle. The two teams punted nine times in the first 30 minutes with the only scores coming

after a turnover and a trick play.

BYU struck first. Linebacker Andy Katoa recovered a UCLA fumble at the Bruin 47 early in the first quarter, and after a Bob Jensen to Mark Bellini pass. Leonard Chitty put the Cougars ahead 3-0 with a 32-yard field goal. Soon afterward, UCLA stormed ahead to stay with a 71-yard touchdown drive highlighted by a 49-yard run on a reverse by Bruin receiver Karl Dorrell.

The second quarter was scoreless, and UCLA took its 7-3 lead to

the locker room as the halftime festivities began.

From there on out, it was UCLA most of the way. Midway into the third quarter, Bruin fullback David Greenwood dashed 70 yards through the BYU defense and set up Green's one-yard touchdown run. David Franey followed with a 49-yard UCLA field goal and later, Green bolted 79-yards with 52 seconds left in the period to conclude the scoring in the third quarter. At that point, UCLA led 24-3 and Green was well on his way to a new record for rushing yards in a major-college bowl game (266 yards on 33 carries).

The fourth quarter was somewhat anticlimactic, but both teams managed to score a touchdown each. After a Bruin interception deep in BYU territory, Green faked a sweep, pulled up and hit Dorrell on a 13-yard scoring pass. BYU countered with a long scoring drive highlighted by two Mike Young to Chuck Cutler passes, and when Leonard Chitty tacked on the extra point after a 3-yard Bruce Hansen touchdown run with little over a minute remaining, the scoring in

Freedom Bowl III was complete.

Cougar quarterbacks Bob Jensen and Mike Young managed to pass for over 200 yards, but UCLA and Green did most of the damage. Costly injuries to BYU standouts Mark Bellini (ankle) and Andy Katoa (knee) also hindered the Cougar effort. On the evening, Jensen completed 18 passes in 31 attempts for 124 yards with three interceptions, and Young was on target seven times in 12 attempts for 97 yards.

Florida Citrus Bowl, 1985

Ohio State 10, BYU 7 December 28 Orlando



In what promised to be a offensive showdown between passhappy BYU (11-2) and rough and tumble Ohio State (8-3), two of the nation's top defenses took center stage. In fact, the game's only touchdowns were produced by a noseguard on an interception and a reserve wide receiver on a broken play. The rest of the contest was

16 22 marked by intense hitting, and as is the case with most defensive struggles, the team that made the fewest mistakes won the ball

game.

Buckeye kicker Rich Spangler tallied the first points of the game with a 47-yard field goal early in the second quarter to give Ohio State a 3-0 lead. BYU attempted to answer with a long drive of its own, only to come away empty after Vai Sikahema fumbled on an apparent touchdown plunge.

Before the first half ended, however, the Cougars again mounted a long drive and finally hit paydirt when quarterback Robbie Bosco rolled left, whirled right and found wide receiver David Miles on a 38-yard scoring strike to give the Cougars a 7-3 halftime lead.

When the teams returned to the field for the second half, misfortune immediately struck the Cougars. Deep in his own territory, Bosco attempted to throw a short pass underneath the dropping Buckeye linebackers and instead found Ohio State noseguard Larry Kolic who snatched the errant pass and took it in for an OSU touchdown and a 10-7 lead.

The circumstances seemed ripe for another bowl game miracle

for the Cougars, but it was not to be.

Bosco was able to lead BYU on two late drives but both were

stopped by Buckeye interceptions.

On the day, Bosco was 26 for 50 and a touchdown, but miscues told the story. Ohio State was the benefactor of six Cougar turnovers, and the Big-10 Buckeyes went home the victor.

Holiday Bowl VII, 1984

BYU 24, Michigan 17 December 21 San Diego



Holiday Bowl VII lived up to all the glamour and excitement of the previous six bowls, plus it had a new dimension—national championship luster—thanks to BYU's undefeated, untied season and No. 1 ranking. The 24-17 Cougar victory marked the first time in years that a non-New Year's Day bowl game determined the national championship.

The contest was played in typical Holiday Bowl fashion. After a scoreless first quarter in which Cougar quarterback Robbie Bosco was forced to the sideline with an injured knee and ankle, the game began to develop drama. BYU scored first with 8:37 left in the first half on a five-yard run by Kelly Smith. The touchdown was set up when a limping Bosco returned to the lineup and engineered an 80-yard scoring drive.

The Wolverines responded by putting together an 80-yard drive of their own, culminating on Rick Rogers' five-yard touchdown run up the middle. The PAT tied the score at 7-7. The tie was short-lived, however, as a 31-yard field goal by Lee Johnson with time running

out in the first half gave BYU a 10-7 lead.

Midway through the third period, Michigan went on top for the first time at 14-10 on a 10-yard scoring strike from Bob Zurbrugg to Bob Perryman. The Wolverines added to their lead when Bob Bergeron nailed a 32-yard field goal to make it 17-10 with 14:14 to play in the game. The Cougar offense then produced an 80-yard drive that culminated with a seven-yard Bosco-to-Glen Kozlowski touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17 with 10:51 to go.

Bosco's 13-yard scoring toss to Smith with 1:23 remaining made it

24-17 and clinched a 13-0 season and the Cougars' first-ever national championship. For the game, BYU passed for 371 yards and rushed for another 112. The Cougar defense, meanwhile, held Michigan to 120 yards rushing and 80 yards passing. Attendance: 61.243.

Holiday Bowl VI, 1983

BYU 21, Missouri 17 December 23 San Diego



Yet another chapter was added to the saga of impossible, thrilling Holiday Bowl finishes when BYU defeated Missouri 21-17. The game was billed as a classic matchup between Missouri's stubborn defense and BYU's explosive offense, led by quarterback Steve Young

For most of the game the defenses were in control. Missouri held BYU to just 167 yards of total offense in the first half and gave up only one touchdown to the Cougars. BYU's defense, however, allowed the Tigers only 157 yards of offense and 10 points in the first half. Missouri got its first-half points on a two-yard run by Eric Drain and a

37-yard field goal by Brad Burditt.

BYU's touchdown came on a 10-yard quarterback draw by Young. In the second half, Young hit Eddie Stinnett with a 33-yard pass. But Missouri came right back with another two-yard plunge by Drain. A valiant goal-line stand by BYU's defense gave the offense the ball on

the six yard line with 3:57 left in the game.

The Cougars marched down field until, with a first-and-10 situation on the Missouri 15 yard line, Young handed the ball to Stinnett, who faked a sweep and lofted the ball back to Young. The ball barely cleared the outstretched hands of Missouri's Bobby Bell, but Young hauled in the throw and rambled into the end zone. The extra point gave BYU the lead 21-17 with only 23 seconds left.

Kyle Morrell then intercepted a Missouri desperation pass. Young finished the game 24 of 36 passing for 314 yards and three interceptions. Casey Tiumalu picked up 57 yards on 27 carries. Attendance:

The Cougars had their two-game Holiday Bowl win streak snapped by Ohio State, 47-17, in a game that took the fun out of the usually raucous affair in San Diego.

The BYU bubble burst at the outset of the third quarter, when the Buckeyes reeled off 17 unanswered points, while BYU only got one snap... an interception at that. The OSU damage came mainly on the ground, as Buckeye runners rolled up 329 yards en route to their seventh consecutive win.

Tim Spencer was the main gun for the Bucks, as he blew through the Cougar defense for 167 yards, including a record-setting 61-yard touchdown run in the second quarter that put OSU up 10-7.

As usual, the BYU quarterback rolled up impressive marks, but the Cougars had trouble making points out of Steve Young's 341 yards passing of 27 of 45 accuracy. The Cougars turned the ball over to OSU three times inside the 30 and saw the Bucks convert each turnover into a score.

The Cougars' two touchdowns were at each end of the game, with the first, a seven-yard strike to Neil Balholm, coming in the opening quarter and the final tally, a 16-yard Young-to-Hudson connection, in the final stanza. Attendance: 52,533.

Holiday Bowl IV, 1981

The 1981 edition of the Holiday Bowl fit the mold of its predecessors. This time it was the Cougars of BYU versus the Cougars of Washington State playing before a crowd of 52,419. Again it was like two different games. BYU held a 24-7 lead at halftime, then pushed the score to 31-7, as Tom Holmoe intercepted a pass and returned it 35 yards to give the WAC team a comfortable 31-7 edge.

But as the second half progressed, it appeared BYU would be the come-from-behind victim in this one. With only 59 seconds left in the third period, WSU brought the score to 31-28, and from there the team from Provo had to hold on for its life.

In a crucial third-and-12 situation on BYU's 18 yard line with 30 seconds remaining in the third period, McMahon began completing passes that covered 82 yards and put BYU in the end zone again to stretch the lead to 38-28.



One pundit said the 1980 Holiday Bowl was actually two ball games—the first a contest that lasted most of four quarters, the other that was of four minutes duration. SMU seemed in control the first game, while the Cougars, behind 20 points with only minutes remaining, surged to a stunning 46-45 win.

Unfortunately, many fans either turned off their TV sets or left the stadium in San Diego before the "second game" began. For 56 minutes the Mustangs taught the Cougars a lesson in running the football. The Mustang's two great runners, Craig James and Eric Dickerson, rushed for a combined total of 335 yards.

With 4:07 remaining in the game, SMU scored to go ahead, 45-25. From there, the Cougars connected on a TD pass, recovered an on-side kick, scored on a one-yard scamper by Scott Phillips, blocked a punt and, finally (with three seconds left on the clock), scored on a "Hail Mary" pass of 46 yards from Jim McMahon to Clay Brown. With the score tied, Kurt Gunther kicked the extra point to send BYU fans streaming onto the field.

Statistically, McMahon completed 32 of 49 passes for 446 yards. It may have been the most exciting bowl game ever with the Cougars getting 21 points in the final two minutes and 33 seconds.

Holiday Bowl II, 1979

Indiana 38, BYU 37 December 21 San Diego



The 1979 season ended with BYU leading the nation in three major categories: scoring, passing and total offense. Moreover, the Cougars were one of the few undefeated, untied teams in the nation with an 11-0 mark.

Those kinds of credentials, plus their national rankings in the polls (9th UPI and AP), made the Mountain Cats favorites over the atlarge entry, Indiana. It was BYU's first-ever meeting with a Big Ten school, and the net result was one of the most exciting bowl games of the season.

The opportunistic Hoosiers played BYU even in the first quarter, then carried a 21-17 lead at the half. BYU spurted ahead in the third period, 34-31, on a 15-yard pass from All-American Marc Wilson to fullback Eric Lane.

But midway through the fourth quarter, Indiana's Tim Wilber returned a punt 62 yards to push the Hoosiers ahead 38-37. With 2:06 remaining, the Cougars moved the ball 69 yards to the Indiana 10 yard line.

Then, with 11 seconds left, Brent Johnson missed a 27-yard field goal that would have made the score 40-38. Marc Wilson was voted the MVP on offense (28 of 43 for 380 yards) and Indiana's cornerback, Tim Wilber, won the honor on defense. Attendance: 52,200.

The inaugural game of the Holiday Bowl pitted two teams with local drawing power, the Naval Academy and Brigham Young University. Despite chilly temperatures, (for San Diego that is), the two teams engaged in a hard-hitting battle.

The Cougars had a 16-3 lead at one point, even though the score was 9-3 at the end of the first half. Defense dominated the first two quarters. Brent Johnson put the Cougars on the scoreboard first with a 33-yard field goal with 8:26 left in the first quarter. But Navy's Bob Tata boomed through a 40-yard field goal to tie the score at 3-3.

Jim McMahon sent the Cougars ahead with a 10-yard pass to Mike Chronister, but Johnson missed the extra point. McMahon ran another in from two-yards out in the third period before the Middies took charge. Navy scored two field goals in the fourth quarter, but it was a 65-yard pass to Phil McConkey that did the Cougars in.

Some 48,003 witnessed the game in person. McConkey was named Best Offensive Player, BYU's Tom Enlow won Best Defensive Player honors for the game. Navy finished the year with a 9-3 record, BYU with a 9-4 mark.

The Cougars, however, stayed close in the first half, which ended 28-14. But Dave Lowry returned the second-half kickoff 102 yards (a Tangerine Bowl record) to bring the score to 21-28. The crowd of 37,812 fans saw the two teams roll up 70 points between them.

Quarterback Gifford Nielsen completed 23 of 34 passes for 209 yards and one touchdown, but the Cougars could only roll up 255 total yards to 402 for OSU. BYU's record was 9-2 prior to the Tangerine Bowl game.

Oklahoma State had tied for the Big Eight title but missed out on the Orange Bowl due to the league's tie-breaking formula.

Competing in their first post-season bowl game ever, BYU played Western Athletic Conference host to the Cowboys of Oklahoma State before a crowd of 50,878.

The Cougars got off to a quick start with two field goals during the first quarter before All-WAC quarterback Gary Sheide was injured in the last moments of the first quarter. He was replaced by junior reserve Mark Giles.

The Cowboys took the scoring lead during the second quarter on a TD run around left end, so the halftime score was OSU 7, BYU 6. OSU regained possession of the ball on the Cougars' 17 yard line after intercepting a Giles-to-Tom Toolson pass, but was unable to convert on the turnover.

A field goal from 32 yards out put the Cowboys in front 10-7 at the end of the third quarter. With 1:14 remaining in the game, OSU scored another TD on a 40-yard halfback pass to complete the scoring. The Cougars outgained the Cowboys in total yardage 301 to 214. Giles was 11 out of 26 for 138 yards. BYU's record was 7-3-1 prior to the Fiesta Bowl.





Live broadcasts of football games can be heard on stations in Idaho, Utah, Nevada and Arizona.

KBYUTV

The tradition continues . . . KBYU and Cougar football. Again this year, KBYU Television will provide delayed broadcasts of all home and selected road football games.

With Jay Monsen doing the play-by-play, the Channel 11 broadcasts offer the insightful analysis that viewers have come to expect.

In addition, KBYU will serve as producer for all live telecasts of BYU football.

An experienced sports crew and state-of-the-art equipment have enabled KBYU to develop a reputation for outstanding coverage of football, basketball and other major "remote" events in the Western U.S.


At Cougar games, KBYU regularly provides feed for visiting television stations and networks, special satellite broadcasts and Bonneville International Corporation's sports broadcasts in South America.

The KBYU remote production system includes five Ikegami HL 79E cameras; a 2 ME, 16 input Grass Valley 1680 switcher; dual channel Chyron 4100 graphics system; shotgun sideline microphones; and other equipment all operated from KBYU's 48-foot-long aluminum body remote production trailer. Using this system, KBYU is accustomed to providing tailor-made television for as many as six different clients at one time.

Home Game Coverage

Stadium Location, Parking

BYU's stadium is located on the northwest corner of the campus, just off Canyon Road and University Parkway (1430 North) in Provo. Press parking is in Lot #2, immediately west of the stadium. Parking for the media will also be issued on request.

Press Box (378-2609)

Several telephones (campus extensions) will be available in the main area of the press box. In the past we have had sufficient phones to meet the needs of the media. However, if guaranteed availability is desired, visitors may wish to order their own telephones. One or two telecopiers will also be available on a first-come first serve basis, and the press box staff will be glad to assist in transmitting copy and statistics.

Post-Game Interviews

With three minutes remaining on the game clock, press box representatives from both teams will take the media by elevator to the ground level for post-game interviews with the coaches and players. Locker room passes will be issued before leaving the press box, and there will be the usual mandatory 10-minute cooling off period before entering the dressing room. 
