COUGARS OPEN CONFERENCE PLAY WITH TCU

BYU picked up its first win of the season, and the first of Coach Bronco Mendenhall's career, Sept. 10, against Eastern Illinois. The Cougars will open Mountain West Conference play coming off a bye week by hosting TCU, Sept. 24 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. BYU is 1-1 while TCU is 2-1 overall and 1-0 in the MWC. In the Cougars win over Eastern Illinois, BYU racked up 431 yards of total offense, including Curtis Brown's 110 yards on the ground and John Beck's 255 yards through the air.

A LOOK AT THE HORNFROGS



TCU has been up and down so far this season. After shocking the football world with an upset win, 17-10, over then-No. 7 Oklahoma, the Horned Frogs fell the next week to SMU 21-10. Last Thursday, Sept. 15, TCU defeated Utah 23-20 in overtime, ending the Utes 18-game win streak. The Frogs defeated Utah with a strong running attack and solid defense. Freshman running back Aaron Brown, playing in his first game, had his way against the Utes, running 17 times for 168 yards. Robert Merrill added 67 rushing yards and two touchdowns, while quarterback Tye Gunn was 8-of-17 for 88 yards and threw a game-winning touchdown to Michael Depriest. Merrill has 189 yards on the season and Cory Rodgers leads the team in receiving with 172 yards on 20 catches.

COMPLETE BROADCAST PLANS

SERIES INFORMATION

BYU and TCU have played four times with the Cougars owning the series lead, 3-1. The last time the teams met was in 1997 in Provo. BYU defeated the Horned Frogs 31-10 to improve to 2-0 in Provo against TCU. After a slow first half that ended in a 3-3 tie, the Cougars scored 28 consecutive points, including 21 in the third. Brian McKenzie scored on a two-yard run to start the run and Drew Miller threw touchdown passes on the next three scores. Aaron Roderick caught the first and third while Ben Cahoon caught the second. Miller finished 16-of-26 on the day for 180 yards and three touchdowns. Cahoon caught 10 passes for 142 yards and one touchdown. BYU defeated the Frogs 45-21 the previous season.



TWO GAMES, TWO TEAMS

Between the first and second games of the season, the Cougars have improved on penalties and backpedaled on turnovers. Against Boston College, BYU had 10 penalties for 85 and zero turnovers. In game two against Eastern Illinois, the Cougars had just 5 penalties for 30 yards but turned the ball over four times on two interceptions and two fumbles.

SLOW START, GOOD FINISH

While BYU fell 20-3 in its season opener to Boston College, historical trends indicate the Cougars should still have a successful season. Since 1974, BYU has opened 12 seasons with a loss. In those 12 seasons, the Cougars had winning records in 11 and were .500 in the other. The last time BYU opened the season with a loss and had a losing record was 1973 when the team finished 5-6. On the other hand, BYU opened with a win from 2002-04 and finished with a losing record. The following is a list of the 12 seasons since 1974 BYU opened with a loss:

GET BACK ON THE WINNING SIDE

The Cougars endured three-consecutive losing seasons from 2002-04 for the first time since 1962-64. An interesting parallel is that legendary coach LaVell Edwards joined the staff in 1962 as a defensive coach when the team was struggling but took over in 1972 as head coach and took the team to 22 bowl games. Mendenhall joined the team in 2003, BYU's second-consecutive losing season, as the defensive coordinator.

EDWARDS STADIUM



LaVell Edwards Stadium, with its 64,045-seat capacity and immaculate surroundings, is home to BYU football. Originally Cougar Stadium was built in 1964 and seated 45,000. It was expanded in 1982 to seat 65,000. In 1982, 1988 and 1997, the Football Writers Association of America cited BYU for its "outstanding pressbox working area."

BECK'S STREAK ENDS

Tristan Burge of Eastern Illinois intercepted a John Beck pass midway through the second quarter. It was the first interception Beck had thrown since BYU lost to New Mexico, 21-14, Nov. 13, 2004 in Provo. During that stretch, Beck completed 86-of-135 pass attempts (.637).

YOUNG GUN

While Mendenhall has 16 years of assistant coaching experience, he is now a head coach for the first time in his career. Despite his extensive experience, he is the fourth youngest coach in NCAA Division I-A football at the age of 39. Mike Gundy of Oklahoma State is 38 and is one year, five months and 22 days younger than Mendenhall.

WHERE'S THE BEEF?

The BYU offensive line doesn't order salads when it goes out to eat. Each starter weighs over 300 pounds for an average of 325 and a total of 1,625. They will be going up against a TCU defensive line that weighs an average of 264 pounds. The Horned Frogs' offensive line weighs on average of 297 pounds while BYU's defensive line weighs an average of 317.3.

CURTIS BROWN'S BIG DAY

Curtis Brown rushed for 110 rushing yards on 18 carries and scored one touchdown against Eastern Illinois, Sept. 10, 2005. It was the first time since BYU played San Diego State, Nov. 6, 2004, that a Cougar player had 100 yards rushing. That day Brown had 106 yards in BYU's 49-16 win. Brown also had four catches for 14 yards against Eastern Illinois. Brown has run for over 100 yards six times in his career.

ROOKIE HEAD COACHES

Bronco Mendenhall became BYU's 14th head coach, the 13th man to hold the job, on Dec. 13, 2004. The coaches have had varied levels of success in their first year at the helm. Four head coaches have enjoyed winning records at the beginning of their tenures, including twice by Eddie Kimball. Two coaches won half of their games while the rest had losing seasons. In their debut games, rookie coaches are 7-7. The following is a list of BYU football coaches' first year records.

BACK IN THE ENDZONE AGAIN

When Curtis Brown scored on a one-yard run against Eastern Illinois on the Cougars' first drive, it was BYU's first touchdown since the season finale in 2004 at Utah when Austin Collie caught a 16-yard touchdown pass from John Beck in the third quarter. BYU lost the game, 52-21.



BRONCO MENDENHALL



After 16 seasons as an assistant coach, including the past two years as the defensive coordinator for the Cougars, Bronco Mendenhall was promoted to head football coach at Brigham Young University on December 13, 2004. Mendenhall becomes the 14th head coach since the University first officially recognized football as an intercollegiate sport in 1922.

Mendenhall (38)--one of the youngest NCAA Division I-A head coaches in the country--has served the past two seasons as the defensive coordinator and secondary coach for the Cougars. During his first season in Provo, Mendenhall engineered the nation's 14th-ranked defense, holding opponents to just 307 yards per game. Under Mendenhall's direction, the Cougars ranked eighth nationally in passing defense, giving up just 176.17 yards per game.

In 2004, the Cougars ranked third in the Mountain West in rushing defense, allowing 149.3 yards per game. The Cougars also ranked second in the league, with 34 sacks for a combined loss of 232 yards.

A native of Alpine, Utah, Mendenhall began his coaching career as a graduate assistant in 1989 at his alma mater, Oregon State. After earning his master's degree in 1990, he moved to Snow College in Ephraim, Utah, where he served as the secondary coach and defensive coordinator from 1991-92 under current BYU assistant coach Paul Tidwell. Following two seasons with the Badgers, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Northern Arizona, where the Lumberjacks boasted the top-ranked defense in the Big Sky Conference. He was elevated to co-defensive coordinator for the 1994 season.

In 1995, Mendenhall returned to Oregon State to become the defensive line coach under then defensive coordinator Rocky Long. When Long left to become the defensive coordinator at UCLA, Mendenhall was promoted to defensive coordinator for the 1996 season. At just 29 years of age, Mendenhall was the youngest defensive coordinator in Pac-10 history.

In 1997, Mendenhall became the secondary coach at Louisiana Tech where he helped the Bulldogs to a remarkable 9-2 record as his defensive unit was credited with 17 interceptions, allowing just 15 touchdowns on the season.

In 1998, Mendenhall moved to Albuquerque, N.M., to become the defensive coordinator and secondary coach at the University of New Mexico. Over the next five seasons, the Lobos improved from just three wins in 1998 to seven wins and an invitation to the Las Vegas Bowl in 2002. In the Lobos' 27-13 loss against UCLA in the Las Vegas Bowl, the Mendenhall-led defense held the Bruins to a season-low 167 yards.

Under Mendenhall, the Lobos led the Mountain West Conference in rushing defense for three straight seasons. In 2001, New Mexico gave up just 87.4 yards per game over the season. In his final season in Albuquerque, Mendenhall led the Lobos to a top ranking against league opponents in total defense, allowing just 316.4 yards per game. The Lobos also led the MWC in sacks in both the 2000 and 2002 season, totaling 46 and 38, respectively.

At New Mexico, Mendenhall played a valuable role in the development of the 1999 Mountain West Player of the Year, Consensus All-American and first-round NFL Draft pick Brian Urlacher. The ninth overall selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, Urlacher was voted the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Year and was a Pro Bowl selection. Urlacher was one of two rookies to play all 16 games, starting at middle linebacker the final 14 games to establish a team record for starts at the position by a rookie. He shattered Bears rookie records with 165 total tackles and eight sacks, making him the second Chicago first-year player to lead the team in tackles. Urlacher finished his collegiate career ranked third on New Mexico's all-time list with 442 tackles.

As a player, Mendenhall was a two-year starter at cornerback for Snow College from 1984-85. In his second season, Mendenhall captained the Badgers to a perfect 11-0 record and the NJCAA National Championship. That same season, he earned many

accolades, including first-team all-conference, all-region, second-team NJCAA All-America and JC Gridwire Academic All-America honors.

Mendenhall transferred to Oregon State and was a two-year starter, playing free safety, strong safety and linebacker for the Beavers. Mendenhall was a team captain as a senior and received the Leo Gribkoff Memorial Award, given to the team's most inspirational player.

Mendenhall was raised in Alpine, Utah, and graduated from American Fork High School in 1984. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Oregon State in 1988 and a master's degree in education with an emphasis in exercise physiology also from OSU in 1990.

His older brother, Mat, played football at BYU from 1975-79, before spending four years in the NFL with the Washington Redskins. Another brother, Marty, was a former Mr. Utah bodybuilder. Mendenhall's father, Paul, was a defensive end at BYU from 1953-54.

Mendenhall, who resides in Alpine, Utah, is married to the former Holly Johnston of Missoula, Mont. The couple have three sons: Cutter (5), Breaker (3) and Raeder (18 mo.).

PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

The BYU coaching staff leads the Mountain West Conference with five members of its coaching staff who have played football in the National Football League or the old USFL. Associate Head Coach and running backs coach Lance Reynolds was drafted by the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1978 and also played for Philadelphia. Offensive coordinator Robert Anae was drafted in the third round by the New Jersey Generals of the USFL. Quarterbacks coach Brandon Doman was drafted by the San Francisco 49'ers in 2002 and also played with the Washington Redskins. Cornerbacks coach Brian Mitchell was drafted by the Atlanta Falcons where he played for three seasons. He also played for the Dallas Cowboys.

SOMEBODY'S WATCHING YOU...

Six members of the 2005 BYU football team - John Beck, Curtis Brown, Daniel Coats, Cameron Jensen, Jake Kuresa, Lance Reynolds and Todd Watkins - have been named to various "watch lists" for postseason awards.

John Beck, 6-2, 210, Quarterback: John Beck has been selected to the Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award watch list, which honors the nation's best quarterback. Beck started 10 of 11 games his sophomore year and threw for 2,563 yards and 15 touchdowns. He averaged an MWC best 261.0 yards per game against league opponents. Beck earned second-team All-MWC honors as a sophomore.

Manaia Brown, 6-4, 310, Defensive Line: Manaia Brown has been named to the Lombardi Award watch list. Brown started eight of 11 games in 2004, registering 26 tackles, nine for a loss of 48 yards. He also registered 4.5 sacks. He was named All-MWC Honorable Mention.

Curtis Brown, 6-0, 210, Running Back: Curtis Brown has been named a Doak Walker Award candidate. In 2004, Brown had over 100 yards in four-straight games, including a season-high 159 against Wyoming. Against the Cowboys, he threw a 40-yard touchdown pass and ran for the score that put the Cougars ahead for good. He is only the fourth BYU player to crack the 1,000-yard rushing mark during his sophomore year.

Daniel Coats, 6-3, 250, Tight End: Daniel Coats has been selected to the John Mackey Award watch list. He played all 11 games for BYU as a sophomore, catching 13 passes for 160 yards. He had a season-best four receptions for 42 yards against Air Force. As a freshman in 2003, Coats earned freshman All-America honors from The Sporting News.

Jake Kuresa, 6-5, 330, Offensive Line: Jake Kuresa has been named to the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award watch lists. He has started every game (23) in his two year career. As a freshman, he played both guard and tackle and played exclusively at tackle as a sophomore. Kuresa helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 24.3 points, 105.8 yards rushing and 279.5 yards passing per game in 2004.

Cameron Jensen, 6-5, 330, Linebacker: Cameron Jensen has been named to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, Butkus Award and Lombardi Award watch lists. He started all 11 games in 2004 and led the team in total tackles with 103, solo tackles with 49 and assisted tackles with 54. His 12.0 tackles for loss and two fumble recoveries tied him for first on the team and he added two interceptions, one of which he returned for a touchdown against UNLV.

Lance Reynolds, 6-3, 293, Offensive Line: Lance Reynolds has been named to the Rimington Trophy watch list. He started every game in 2004 at center. He helped anchor an offensive unit that averaged 24.3 points, 105.8 yards rushing and 279.5 yards passing per game in 2004.

Todd Watkins, 6-3, 194, Wide Receiver: Todd Watkins has been named to the Biletnikoff watch list. He led the Mountain West Conference with 1,042 yards receiving in 2004 and set a league single-season record, averaging 94.7 yards per contest. He also caught 52 passes and six touchdowns, four of which were for 68, 69, 70 and 79 yards.

300 YARD EFFORT

John Beck completed 41-of-60 passes for 330 yards against No. 22 Boston College in the season opener, his fifth-career 300 yard game. He is now tied with Gary Sheide and Sean Covey for the 10th most career 300-yard games.

SETTING RECORDS

Beck's 41 completions on 60 attempts against the Boston College Eagles, Sept. 3, was a career high for the junior quarterback. It was also a LaVell Edwards Stadium record and a Mountain West Conference record. He set the MWC and Edwards Stadium records for attempts when threw 67 passes against UNLV in 2004.

SPREADING THE WEALTH

Davey O'Brien Award candidate Beck has completed a pass to 10 different players this season, including nine different players in each of BYU's two games. Against Boston College, each player that caught a pass had at least two receptions. Against Eastern Illinois, eight of the nine players that recorded a reception had multiple catches.

COUGARS SPORT TRADITIONAL UNIFORMS



Beginning with the 2005 season, the Cougars will wear the uniform that still remains the visible icon of the great football tradition at BYU.

The home uniform will feature a dark-blue jersey with white pants, while the road uniform will include the white jersey with dark-blue pants. Both the home and road uniforms will be trimmed with "Northwestern" style stripes on the sleeves, as well as down the sides of the pants. In addition, the Cougars will wear white

helmets with the traditional helmet logo and blue stripes. While there have been three uniform changes in the past six years, Mendenhall said the new, traditional uniform is back to stay. Mendenhall also said the names of the players will also be displayed on the back of the uniforms, and players will receive "cougar head" helmet decals for notable performances both on and off the field.

Since 1999, when BYU changed its official school colors, the Cougars have had three different uniforms. BYU unveiled a new uniform in 1999, followed by a revision in 2000. Last season the Cougars sported a new look that featured the "UCLA" insert over the shoulder.

MOVING AT WILL

After failing to reach the endzone in the season opener against Boston College, the Cougars made sure to get there early on Saturday against Eastern Illinois. BYU received the opening kickoff and scored on a one-yard run by Curtis Brown to cap an 8-play 67-yard drive that took 3:26. The Cougars mixed it up on the drive, running the ball five times and passing three.

17 IN A QUARTER

The Cougars scored 17 points in the first quarter against Eastern Illinois. The last time BYU scored at least 17 points in the first quarter was against Colorado State in 2001 in Provo, when the Cougars defeated the Rams 56-34. BYU scored 21 in the opening frame on a seven-yard run by Brandon Doman and two two-yard runs by Luke Staley.

BLOCKED KICKS

At the end of the first half against No. 22 Boston College, sophomore kicker Jared McLaughlin attempted the first field goal of his career, a 48-yarder that was blocked by Boston College's Karim El Nokali. It was the first time a BYU field goal had been blocked since 1999 against Utah. After the Eagles failed on third down on their third drive of the second half, Johnny Ayers' punt was blocked by BYU sophomore linebacker Bryan Kehl. It was the first punt BYU had blocked since 2004 against Air Force.

NOT GONNA GET THESE GUYS OFF THE FIELD

Several Cougars have been mainstays in the lineup for the last few years. Outland Trophy and Lombardi award candidate Jake Kuresa has started every game since 2003, a total of 25. John Mackey Award candidate Daniel Coats has 22 starts since 2003. Brian Sanders, Lance Reynolds and Cameron Jensen started all 11 games in 2004, while John Beck, a Davey O'Brien Award candidate, and Todd Watkins, a Biletnikoff candidate, each started 10-of-11 games in 2004. Each of those players have started both games so far in 2005. Senior linebacker Paul Walkenhorst leads the team with 31 career starts and 37 career games played.

BROTHERS DON'T SIT, BROTHERS GOTTA PLAY

BYU has a long tradition of several members from the same family suiting up to hit the gridiron. Brothers Lance, Jr. and Dallas Reynolds have started both games this season. Lance, a senior, is on the watch list for the Rimington Trophy, awarded to the top center in the nation. Dallas, a freshman, was heavily recruited out of high school and joined the Cougars this season after serving a mission for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Seattle, Washington.



ON THE AIR

The exclusive radio home of BYU Football and flagship of the Cougar Sports Network is KSL NEWSRADIO (1160 AM and 102.7 FM) in Salt Lake City. The "Voice of the Cougars" is Greg Wrubell, now in his 5th season as play-by-play commentator. A BYU alum, Wrubell joined the broadcast crew in 1992 as the sideline/locker-room reporter. He began calling BYU basketball games in 1996.

Joining Wrubell is game analyst and former BYU quarterback Marc Lyons. Lyons is a 24-year veteran of Cougar football broadcasts and co-host of the midweek "Bronco Mendenhall Show." A pair of BYU greats join the KSL Broadcast team this season, with two-time all-conference kick returner James Dye reporting from the sidelines and locker-room, and three-time NFL Pro-Bowl selection Chad Lewis joining Lyons and Dye on the pregame "Cougar Countdown Show." The gameday studio host is KSL's Scott Haws, a former BYU student-athlete and all-conference pitcher for the baseball Cougars.

Chief Engineer John Dehnel returns for his 21st season, while veteran statistician Ralph Sokolowsky and spotter Doug Martin complete the lineup in the booth.

KSL's game day coverage begins two hours prior to kickoff with the "Cougar Countdown Show." The "Cougar Pregame Scoreboard Show" starts the broadcast's second hour, with the "Cougar Pregame Coach's Show" 35 minutes prior to kickoff, followed by the "Cougar Kickoff Show."

After the game, KSL presents the "Cougar Postgame Scoreboard Show," followed by the "Cougar Locker Room Show," "Cougar Postgame Coach's Show," "Cougar Call-In Show" and "IFA Country Store Replay."

IN GOOD COMPANY

Through his freshman and sophomore years, John Beck compiled 3,427 yards passing. Only two BYU quarterbacks passed for more yards in their first two years of college football. Heisman trophy winner Ty Detmer recorded 5,812 yards in 1988-89, including 4,560 in 1989 as a sophomore. John Walsh had 4,678 yards from 1991-93, including 3,727 as a sophomore in 1993. He threw for 857 in 1992 before going down with a shoulder injury and being granted a medical redshirt.

IT'S AUTOMATIC ... ALMOST

BYU, known traditionally for its high-octane offenses, rarely gets shutout. Until the Cougar's 3-0 loss to the University of Utah to end the 2003 season, BYU had scored in 361-consecutive games, which remains an NCAA record, dating back to the 1975 season. The Cougars started a new streak in 2004, scoring in every game and extending the streak to 12 games against No. 22 Boston College, Sept. 3, 2005. Since October 3, 1975, BYU has scored in 374-of-375 games. Below is a list of the 12-longest streaks of teams scoring in consecutive games.

FIRST-HALF SHUTOUT

The Cougars led 31-0 at the half against Eastern Illinois. It was the first time BYU shutout its opponent in the first half since leading New Mexico 10-0 before the break in 2003. The Cougars went on to win that game 10-7.

PARTY LIKE ITS 1999 ... or 98

Several Cougars started their BYU football careers before the start of the 21st century, including Spencer White, Fahu Tahi, Nate Soelberg, Brian Sanders, Chris Hale and Matt Berry, who joined the team in 1999 before serving missions. But they aren't the oldest Cougars. That honor belongs to T.J. Sitake, who redshirted in 1998. Hale and Tahi both made big impacts in 1999. Hale caught four pass for 55 yards, including the game-winning 38-yard touchdown reception in the season opener against Washington at home. Tahi led the team in rushing yards that season, totaling 445 on 102 carries. To put in perspective how long these players have been associated with the program, the newcomers straight out of high school were 11 or 12-years old and still playing pickup football in their backyards.

CALLED TO SERVE

There are currently 62 returned missionaries (59 percent) on the BYU roster who have served full-time, two-year missions for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in over 21 different countries around the world. All totaled members of this year's team have served missions in Australia, Argentina, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, England, Germany, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Norway, Panama, Philippines, Portugal, Russia, Samoa, Spain, Tonga, United States and Uruguay. Members of this year's team can communicate fluently in at least 12 different languages.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints operates more than 330 missions around the world with approximately 56,000 missionaries. There are four lettermen from last year's team who are currently serving missions, including Matt Bauman (Harrisburg, Pa.), R.J. Willing (Albuquerque, N.M.), Dennis Pitta (Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic) and Freshman All-American receiver Austin Collie (Buenos Aires, Argentina).

THE RANKED TEAMS

With BYU's loss to No. 22 Boston College, the Cougars are now 0-11 against ranked teams since defeating No. 23 Colorado State, 34-13, on Sept. 16, 1999. During that streak BYU is 0-3 at LaVell Edwards Stadium. BYU has not defeated a ranked opponent on the road since beating Arizona State, 13-10, on Sept. 20, 1997.

CAREER 300-YARD GAMES

BYU has traditionally focused on the pass, leading to 19 different Cougars throwing for 300 yards in at least one game for a combined 174 games. Junior John Beck has made a contribution of five games to that list. He entered the 2005 season with four but threw for 330 yards against No. 22 Boston College, giving him five. Beck is currently tied with Gary Sheide and Sean Covey for 10th most. Ty Detmer tops the list with an astronomical 34. Cougars with 300-yard passing games:

SURPASSING THE CENTURY MARK

With six 100-yard rushing games to his credit, junior Curtis Brown is already tied for fifth in Cougars history for the most career 100-yard rushing games. Against Eastern Illinois, he ran 18 times for 110 yards and scored one touchdown. FIELD DESIGN

Fans coming to home games this season will notice the Cougars' helmet decal has been painted in the center of the field.

"It's a symbol that represents tradition," BYU head coach Bronco Mendenhall said. "To add increased value to what we're returning to, the symbol will be in the middle of the field."

Before the 2005 season, the start of the 2001 season--the BCA Classic vs. Tulane--was the last time a design had been painted on the center of the field.

HOME OPENER ATTENDANCE

Saturday's Labor Day-weekend game at LaVell Edwards against No. 22 Boston College drew a crowd of 58,108. It was the highest attended home game for the Cougars since they played Wyoming, Oct. 16, 2004, when 58,737 were in attendance. The attendances of the following two home games were 53,435 and 53,618 against San Diego State and New Mexico.

BIGGEST HALF

With the Cougar offense firing on all cylinders in the first half against Eastern Illinois, BYU racked up 31 points before halftime. It was the most points the Cougars had scored in a half since totaling 36 in the second half against San Diego State, Nov. 6, 2004.

BIGGEST FIRST HALF

Up 31-0 at the half against Eastern Illinois, it was BYU's biggest first half since Oct. 4, 2003 against San Diego State. In that game, the Cougars led the Aztecs 31-24 before the break.

COUGARS ON TELEVISION

Three of BYU's games are already scheduled for regional or national broadcast. The season opener was on ABC and broadcast to a regional audience. The San Diego State game, slated for Oct. 1, will be broadcast nationally on ESPN Classic. It will be a sequel of sorts as the 1991 game between the teams ended in an epic 52-52 draw, and is often replayed on the station. The second nationally televised game is against Notre Dame, scheduled for Oct. 22 in South Bend, Ind. NBC will broadcast the game from Notre Dame Stadium. This Saturday's game (Sept. 24), will be broadcast by ESPN+Plus at 1 p.m. (MT) and will be shown on KJZZ Channel 14.

COUGARS IN THE NFL

REPLAY PUT TO THE TEST

No. 22 Boston College used the new instant replay option on its first possession with 9:40 left in the game. Eagle quarterback Quinton Porter threw to Larry Lester on third down but Vince Feula broke up the pass. The ball popped out and Feula picked it up and ran, fumbled and the ball was picked up by BYU. The Eagles challenged the play and it was ruled that the pass actually hit the ground. Boston College punted on the ensuing play. The Eagles challenged later in the quarter when they thought the Cougars had fumbled. The challenge was denied and Boston College lost a timeout.

ON THE BOARD FIRST

When the No. 22 Boston College Eagles scored with 30 seconds left in the first quarter on Quinton Porter's 14-yard pass to Chris Miller, it was only the third time in 12 games an opponent scored before BYU. In 2004, the Cougars scored first in 9-of-11 games. BYU scored on its first drive against Eastern Illinois and has now scored first in 10-of-13 games.

SCORELESS FIRST

The Cougars failed to score in the first half against No. 22 Boston College. It was the first time BYU was shutout in the first half since losing to Utah, 3-0, November 22, 2003. The Cougars had scored in the first half in 11-straight games.
