### 2009-10 SEASON OPENS FRIDAY AGAINST BRADLEY

BYU (0-0) men's basketball will open the 2009-10 season at home against Bradley (0-0) of the Missouri Valley Conference. The Cougars are coming off a season in which they finished 25-8 overall and 12-4 in the Mountain West Conference to claim their third-straight regular season league title and earn a third-straight trip to the NCAA Tournament. Bradley was 21-15 last season and advanced to the championship game of the Collegenator.com Postseason Tournament. The game is part of the 2009 MWC/MVC Challenge that will feature nine match-ups between the two conferences this season. Friday's game will be televised live on The Mtn. and can be heard live on KSL Newsradio beginning with the pregame show at 6:30 p.m. MT on 102.7 FM and 1160 AM out of Salt Lake City or via the Internet at KSL.com.

### COUGAR QUICK HITS

— BYU is 2-2 in season openers under head coach Dave Rose including wins in its last two openers.

— Since Rose took over as head coach of BYU basketball, the Cougars are 61-3 in the Marriott Center, including a 53-game winning streak from 2005 to 2008 — the longest in school history. The Cougars were 14-2 at home last season.

— Two-time MWC Coach of the Year Dave Rose has guided BYU to three-straight MWC regular season titles and three-straight trips to the NCAA Tournament. Under Rose, BYU also has four-straight 20-win seasons and four-straight postseason appearances. He is on pace to reach 100 wins faster than any other coach in BYU history and has the best record through four seasons of any Cougar coach.

— BYU has been picked to finish first (23 of 24 first-place votes) in the MWC preseason poll by the league's media.

— The Cougars return four starters and five other letterwinners from a squad that went 25-8 overall, shared the MWC regular season title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament.

**LOOKING AT BRADLEY**

Bradley opens its season with the Cougars, the first visit to Provo for the Braves since 1974. Bradley was 21-15 last season including 5-9 on the road. The Braves took second in the CollegeInsider.com Postseason Tournament and were 10-8 in the Missouri Valley Conference. Sam Maniscalco returns to lead Bradley after averaging 12.6 points and 3.1 dimes per game. Also returning are guards Dodie Dunson (10.1 ppg and 2.8 rpg) and Chris Roberts (8.7 ppg and 4.2 rpg) — both starters a year ago. Head coach Jim Les welcomes the return of Andrew Warren, a guard who started in 2007-08 and averaged 13.2 points and 3.6 rebounds before missing all of last season due to injury. Last season Bradley averaged 67.1 points compared to 66.3 points for its opponents. Les enters his eighth season at the helm and is 126-105 overall. He has led the Braves to four-straight postseason appearances, including the NCAA Tournament in 2006, the NIT in 2007, the College Basketball Invitational in 2008 and the CollegeInsider.com Tournament in 2009.

**BRADLEY'S LAST OUTING — WARREN'S RETURN SPARKS BRADLEY IN EXHIBITION WIN**

PEORIA, Ill. - Bradley junior guard Andrew Warren (Indianapolis, Ind./Brebeuf Jesuit Prep), who redshirted the 2008-09 season with a broken foot, hit his first six field goal attempts and all six free throw attempts en route to a team-high 21 points, leading the Braves to a 68-63 exhibition victory versus NCAA Division II Lewis (0-2 exhibitions) Sunday afternoon at Carver Arena. With 10 Bradley players logging between 10 and 24 minutes, sophomore forward Taylor Brown (Atlanta, Ga./Dunwoody H.S.) was Bradley's only other double-digit scorer with 12 points and the 6-foot-6 forward added a team-best eight rebounds. Lewis guard Dennis Thomas, Jr. shared game-high scoring honors with 21 points, while fellow guard Chris McClellan added 16 points. Flyers center Mary Strus pulled down a game-high 15 rebounds. Coming off its first exhibition game at Notre Dame, where Lewis led with less than 15 minutes remaining, the Flyers put up another stiff challenge in the second of their three exhibitions against NCAA Division I opponents. Sunday's game featured seven ties and 15 lead changes before the Bradley senior guard Dodie Dunson (Bloomington, Ill./Bloomington H.S.) gave the Braves the lead for good, 43-41, with an interior bucket with 11:46 remaining. Dunson's basket launched a 13-2 Bradley surge that included a pair of Warren hoops and ended with a Will Eglof putback basket for a 54-43 advantage with 7:16 remaining.

**SERIES NOTES**

Friday's game will be the fourth meeting between BYU and Bradley with the Cougars owning a 2-1 advantage. The teams last met in 1977 with the Cougars winning 86-79 at Bradley. BYU won the only meeting in Provo 100-87 on Dec. 30, 1974.

**MWC/MVC CHALLENGE**

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – The Mountain West Conference and Missouri Valley Conference have announced next season's pairings for the inaugural Challenge Series between the two leagues. The agreement between the Mountain West and Missouri Valley conferences is a four-year term. Nine Challenge Series games will be played each year, and each conference will host a total of 18 games in the four-year period. The Challenge will feature head-to-head competition between nine Mountain West and nine Missouri Valley teams annually. Evansville, by virtue of finishing the 2007-08 MVC regular season in 10th place, will be the Valley school that does not participate in the 2009 Challenge Series. In keeping with the overall objective of the Challenge, match-ups for the first year are based in part on 2008-09 pre-season rankings and on RPI rankings from the previous year, or RPI rankings from the preceding three-year period.

**BYU'S LAST OUTING — FIVE COUGARS SCORE DOUBLE-DIGITS IN EXHIBITION WIN**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 10, 2009) – Five Cougars scored double-digit points as the BYU men's basketball team claimed an 82-46 victory over Central Washington Tuesday night in its final exhibition game before the start of the 2009-10 regular season. Junior Jimmer Fredette scored a game-high 15 points, followed closely by Jonathan Tavernari and Tyler Haws with 14 points apiece. Other Cougars scoring in double-figures were Charles Abouo with 12 points and Brandon Davies with 11. Davies also recorded a team-high eight rebounds. BYU was 3-for-3 to start the game with makes by Haws, Tavernari and Davies to build an early lead. Tavernari then scored seven points as the Cougars went on a 15-2 run to go up 19-5. The Wildcats cut the deficit to single digits after a three-point make by JC Cook, but sophomore Michael Loyd, Jr., recorded a three-pointer of his own to give the Cougars a 24-12 lead with 8:37 remaining in the first half. Aggressive offense paid off for the Cougars with three consecutive and-one situations. After Davies made both a layup and subsequent free throw, a costly Central Washington turnover resulted in two more BYU points by Fredette. The Cougars headed into the locker room ahead 34-16 after a dunk by Davies to end the first half. The Cougars made 14-of-31 shot attempts in the first 20 minutes, while limiting the Wildcats to 5-of-30 shooting from the field. Fredette scored the first basket of the second half with 17:56 on the clock. His make came on a putback after a missed jumper from Jackson Emery. Tavernari made his first three-pointer of the night to help BYU extend its lead to 43-21, while a Central Washington turnover and breakaway layup by Emery resulted in a three-point play. Haws connected from behind the arc for the Cougars' third trey of the game, while the Wildcats' Cook made his second and third three-pointer to narrow BYU's lead to 53-35. The hot shooting continued for BYU, however, as Fredette and Haws connected on back-to-back threes with 8:28 to play in the game. Abouo scored nine points for the Cougars as they put together a 23-0 run, including a three-point play and capped by a two-handed dunk. Sophomore James Anderson recorded a dunk of his own with one minute remaining in the game.

**WHAT WAS SAID AFTER THE GAME ...****BYU Head Coach Dave Rose**

– "I think we accomplished a lot good things tonight. We were able to play a lot of different players and different lineups. All three point guards saw action and each brings a different style of play to the floor."  
– "In the second half we played more comfortably but still with urgency. We were able to attack and we had assists on the majority of our second half baskets."  
– "We still have a lot of evaluation left to do. We'll watch Bradley and our lineup up may be determined by their personnel but I think we have eight or nine different players who could start."

**Central Washington Head Coach Greg Sparling**

– "Playing BYU was probably the best learning experience for our team. They were bigger and more aggressive. I think BYU is great in the transition and runs it better than most teams and that caught us off guard."  
– "They made shots and we didn't. It's as simple as that. We also spent a lot of energy on defense, and so when it was time for offense we were a little drained."  
– "Jimmer Fredette and Jonathan Tavernari are both skilled players that really know and love the game. I am quite impressed with the quality of this BYU team and wish them luck in the future."

– The Cougars asserted themselves down low early, scoring their first eight of ten points in the paint.  
– Only three players had scored for Central Washington by halftime—Roby Clyde (1-of-3), JC Cook (1-of-8) and Toussaint Tyler (3-of-6). The remainder of the Wildcats shot 0-for-13 from the field.  
– BYU improved its FG% (39.2 to 50.0), 3FG% (23.8 to 27.8), and FT% (55.0 to 64.3) from last contest against Trinity Western.  
– Five players scored in double figures for BYU: Jimmer Fredette (15), Jonathan Tavernari (14), Tyler Haws (14), Brandon Davies (11) Charles Abouo (12), and Brandon Davies (11).  
– Five players also collected 5 rebounds or more: Brandon Davies (8), Jonathan Tavernari (7), Jimmer Fredette (6), Charles Abouo (6) and Noah Hartssock (5).  
– Seven Cougars shot a FG% of .500 or better.

**Game Trends**

– BYU made its first three shots it took, with baskets from Haws, Tavernari and Davies  
– Central Washington made 1-of-11 (9.1%) field goals to start the game; all starters missed at least one shot. Later the Wildcats were 2-of-16 (12.5%).  
– BYU opened up the game with an 11-0 run, turning a 21-12 lead into a 32-12 margin from the 8:37 mark to the 4:56 mark in the first period.  
– At halftime, Central Washington had made 5-of-30 field goals (16.7%) while BYU had made 14-of-31 (45.2%).  
– BYU shot a tidy 54.1% (20-37) from the field in the second half.  
– Central Washington's 24.2% FG is the lowest percentage an exhibition team has shot against BYU in over a decade.

**EXHIBITION #1 — FREDETTE SPEARHEADS EXHIBITION WIN**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 5, 2009) – After a rocky start, the BYU men's basketball team overcame the Trinity Western Spartans, 74-56, in an exhibition game Thursday evening at the Marriott Center. Junior guard Jimmer Fredette led BYU with 24 points on 9-of-14 shooting while senior Jonathan Tavernari contributed 18 points on 8-of-16 shooting. The Spartans jumped to an 8-0 lead following a layup on the opening tipoff and a pair of three-pointers before the Cougars could settle down and eventually cut the lead to 15-12 after eight minutes of play. BYU pulled ahead on a Fredette trey to give the Cougars a 20-18 margin, gradually building a 30-24 lead and forcing a Spartan timeout. Seniors Chris Miles and Tavernari scored their first buckets of the season before Fredette stole the ball en route to an easy layup as the Cougars gained a 40-31 halftime advantage. Several Cougars scored their first career points in the opening half, highlighted with a monster dunk by freshman Brandon Davies off a Fredette assist just before the half. Davies and fellow freshman Tyler Haws scored four points apiece in the opening half while transfer Logan Magnusson contributed two points. Both teams struggled from the field with the Cougars shooting 41 percent on 16-of-39 shooting and 3-of-12 in three-point range while the Spartans shot 33 percent from the field. Jacob Doerksen of Trinity Western had 16 points in the opening half and finished the game with 28 going 10-of-19 from the field. The Cougars built a 52-40 lead midway through the second half as the Spartans managed to make crucial shots to stay in the game. Fredette and Tavernari kept the momentum in favor of BYU by converting jump shots and scoring points in transition. The Cougars extended the lead to 61-44 following a Tavernari layup from a Miles steal and a Haws layup from a steal by sophomore Michael Loyd, Jr.

**FREDETTE HITS GAME-WINNER FOR BLUE IN COUGAR TIPOFF**

PROVO, Utah (October 28, 2009) – Cougar fans were introduced to the 2009-2010 BYU Men's Basketball team Wednesday as the Blue Team beat the White Team 66-64 during the Papa John's Cougar Tipoff in the Marriott Center. The evening featured the annual scrimmage where the Cougar squad faced off against each other and fans got their first look at the team. Jimmer Fredette led the Blue squad with 22 points shooting 7-for-13 from the field. Sophomore Charles Abouo also contributed 16 points. The White team was led by Jonathan Tavernari and Jackson Emery who each scored 14 points. The White team came out strong, hitting its first three shots and holding the Blue team scoreless through the first three minutes of the game. The Blue team's first basket came from a Fredette floater in the paint. Jonathan Tavernari had the hot hand early, shooting 3-for-3 in the opening minutes of the game. Fredette responded with two straight threes for the Blue squad. With less than a minute left in the game and the Blue team up 64-59, Tavernari hit a three-point basket to bring the White team within two points. After a defensive stop, the White squad regained possession and Tavernari made a shot off the glass with 10 seconds left to play to tie the game at 64-64. But Fredette refused to let the game go into overtime, making a jumper in the lane at the buzzer. There were several highlights in the game including a Jackson Emery breakaway dunk and a Brandon Davies and-one dunk in traffic. Fans in attendance got a sneak peak at BYU freshmen Davies and Brock Zylstra who each scored six points. Salt Lake Community College transfer Logan Magnusson also made his Cougar debut, adding six points on two three-pointers in the second half.

**EMERY AND MORGAN NAMED TEAM CAPTAINS**

BYU men's basketball coach Dave Rose announced Tuesday that senior Lamont Morgan, Jr., and junior Jackson Emery have been named captains for this year's team. "Jackson and Lamont are team players," Rose said. "They are proven leaders and have the respect of their teammates. They are willing to do whatever it takes to make this team better. Their teammates voted them as captains and I couldn't ask for better leaders." Morgan enters his third year in the program after redshirting in 2007-08 and playing a key role off the bench last season. The 5-foot-10 senior guard averaged 3.6 points, 1.4 rebounds and 1.8 assists while shooting .461 from the field and .412 from downtown. In his first season back from a two-year mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Mexico, Emery started 32 of 33 games while posting averages of 7.8 points, 3.8 rebounds and 3.0 assists. He was third on the team with 47 steals and shot .480 from the field, .377 from downtown and .738 from the free throw line. Known for his hustle and defensive play, Emery earned a spot on the 2009 MWC All-Defensive Team.

**ROSE ANNOUNCES 2010-11 RECRUITING CLASS**

PROVO, Utah (Nov. 12, 2009) – BYU men's basketball coach Dave Rose has announced the commitment of four players who will join the Cougars for the 2010-11 season. Kyle Collinsworth of Provo High School and Anson Winder of Bishop Gorman in Las Vegas have signed national letters of intent while Chris Collinsworth and Nick Martineau will return to BYU after completing two-year missions for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. Kyle Collinsworth, is a 6-foot-6 guard and a gifted ball handler and passer, will join the three-time defending Mountain West conference champions for the 2010-11 season. Last season, Collinsworth led Provo to a 24-1 record while averaging 18.4 points, 7.0 assists and 5.4 rebounds per game as a junior. After leading the Bulldogs to a second-place finish in the state tournament he was named the 4A MVP by the Deseret News and Salt Lake Tribune. Collinsworth also earned 4A tournament MVP honors and All-Valley honors from the Daily Herald. Collinsworth helped lead Provo to state titles his freshman and sophomore seasons. As a sophomore Collinsworth averaged 14.7 points, 3.0 assists and 4.8 rebounds and earned first-team all-state honors from the Deseret News and All-Valley honors from the Daily Herald. Winder, a 6-foot-3 combo guard, follows senior Jonathan Tavernari as the second player to join BYU from Bishop Gorman. Under the direction of Rice, Winder helped lead Bishop Gorman to a 28-5 record, the 4A Nevada state title, the Sunset Regional title and the Sunset Southwest League title his junior season. He posted averaged of 13.8 points, 8.2 rebounds and 3.0 assists and earned all-Southwest Sunset League honors and Bishop Gorman's 2009 Sportsmanship Award. At the High Energy Classic in Gillette, Wyo., Winder earned all-tournament honors. Winder plays for the Triple Double Elite AAU team. Nevada, Portland, UC Riverside and Idaho also recruited Winder. This past summer he posted games with 40 and 36 points. A 6-foot-9 forward with the skills to play at both the small and power forward positions, Chris Collinsworth helped lead BYU to 27-8 record and an outright regular season MVVC title while averaging 3.2 points and 4.8 rebounds and chipping in 14 blocks, 19 assists and nine steals. He led the Cougars in rebounding seven times while posting double-digit boards on three occasions. Martineau, a 5-11 point guard out of Fruit Heights, Utah, played in 20 games as a true freshman. He averaged 5.8 minutes per game and totaled 13 points, 14 assists and eight rebounds. Martineau posted career highs of six points and four assists against Loyola Marymount.

**PRESEASON MWC POLL**

Mountain West Conference media members overwhelmingly selected three-time defending conference champion BYU as the preseason favorite to win the 2009-10 MWC regular season championship at the conference's annual media day in Denver on Tuesday. The Cougars took 23 of the 24 first place votes to finish with 215 points in the poll. BYU returns four starters this season after finishing 12-4 in MWC play and 25-8 overall, including a third consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. This is the second year BYU has been tabbed the top conference team in the preseason poll. Two years ago the Cougars were also placed first and would eventually win the MWC title, going 14-2 in conference play. BYU junior guard Jimmer Fredette was also named Preseason Player of the Year in addition to joining senior forward Jonathan Tavernari in representing BYU on the Preseason All-Conference Team. The Cougars are the only team to have two players on the pre-season squad. Fredette was a first-team all-MWC and MWC All-Tournament Team selection in 2008-09 while also being named to the USBWA All-District team. The junior is the returning leader in scoring (16.2 ppg) and assists (1.35) for the Cougars, having scored in double digits 29 times in 2008-09, including eight games with 20 or more points. Tavernari returns for his final season after earning MWC Freshman of the Year honors in 2006-07 and garnering two All-Conference selections. He is the Cougars' top returning rebounder (7.2 rpg) and ranked among league leaders in 3-point field goals (2nd/.85), steals (3rd/.49), rebounding (4th), scoring (6th/15.7 ppg) and 3-point percentage (8th/.381) last season. San Diego State collected the remaining first-place vote and 166 points to finish in second in the poll, followed closely by UNLV in third with 161 points. Utah and New Mexico landed in the fourth- and fifth-place spots, respectively, with the Utes tallying 143 points to the Lobos' 141 points. Wyoming received 89 points to finish sixth, followed by TCU (82 points) in seventh, Colorado State (58 points) in eighth and Air Force (25 points) in ninth. San Diego State junior Billy White, TCU senior Zvonko Buljan and UNLV junior Tre'Von Willis were also selected to the All-Conference Team.

**TEAM/PLAYER NOTEBOOK**

— At 12-4 in the MWC in 2008-09, BYU shared the regular season title with Utah and New Mexico and became the first team to win three-straight league titles after winning the championship outright in 2007 and 2008. The titles mark the first stretch of three-straight titles for the Cougars since 1932-34. BYU is tied for seventh among all NCAA Division I programs for most regular-season titles won or shared with 28. BYU's 99 MWC wins in the nine-year history of the league leads all MWC teams.

— BYU won its first six home games in 2008-09 to extend its program record home winning streak to 53 games. The streak ended on Jan. 3, 2009 with a 94-87 loss to then-No. 6 Wake Forest. BYU finished 14-2 at home and is 433-118 (.786) all-time in the Marriott Center. Cougar head coach Dave Rose is 61-3 (.953) all-time in the Marriott Center.

— Senior forward Jonathan Tavernari returns as BYU's 25th all-time leading scorer with 1,157 points. He joined the 1,000-point club on Feb. 3, 2009 when he scored 17 points at Air Force. He climbed to 25th by the end of the season and has a chance to crack the top-10 with another strong season. With 202 threes Tavernari is 12 from passing Mark Bigelow for first in school history.

— Junior guard Jimmer Fredette earned first-team All-MWC honors in 2008-09 and was the only sophomore to receive first, second or third-team honors. He also became BYU's first point guard to earn all-conference honors since Marty Haws in 1990. Fredette has 780 career points and will become BYU's 40th member of the 1,000-point club if he maintains his scoring pace from 2008-09. He is also the owner of a .848 career free throw shooting percentage, currently second all-time on BYU's career list.

**NONCONFERENCE HOOPS SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED**

PROVO, Utah (July 16, 2009) – BYU men's basketball coach Dave Rose announced the 2009-10 nonconference schedule Thursday, which features matchups with Arizona, Arizona State and Utah State as well as a trip to the Las Vegas Classic. The 16-game nonconference slate includes teams from nine different conferences and nine teams that qualified for postseason play in 2009. The Mountain West Conference schedule will be announced at a later date.

"We've put together a very competitive and exciting nonconference schedule," Rose said. "Each team plays a different style making every game a challenge, both at home and on the road. Playing in the Las Vegas Classic will be a good test for us as well. It's a schedule that can prepare us to defend our Mountain West Conference championship."

BYU owns a 342-208 record against its nonconference opponents, including the three potential opponents in the Las Vegas Classic. The Cougars will open regular season play by hosting Bradley on Nov. 13 in the first game of the inaugural Mountain West Conference/Missouri Valley Conference Challenge Series. The other eight teams in the MWC will face off against an MVC opponent from Nov. 20 to Dec. 23. Future challenges are scheduled for 2010, 2011 and 2012.

On Nov. 17 BYU will host Idaho State, a team the Cougars have defeated in five-straight contests including 85-65 in 2008. Three days later BYU will head to the Aloha State to play Western Athletic Conference member Hawaii. The two teams last played in 1999, the Cougars' final season as members of the WAC.

After the Hawaii game the blue and white will host Southern University (Nov. 24) and Weber State (Nov. 27). BYU will look to protect its unbeaten home record (17-0) against the Wildcats. The Cougars will open the month of December with in-state rival Utah State. BYU owns a 135-90 record against the Aggies but has lost four-straight in Logan. The game is scheduled for Dec. 2.

On Dec. 5 the Cougars will play at Energy Solutions Arena for the fifth time since 2003 when they host San Francisco. BYU defeated Utah State 68-63 in 2008 at Energy Solutions where the Cougars are 2-2 all-time. BYU will remain in Utah and host Arizona State on Dec. 8 at the Marriott Center. The Cougars will be looking to avenge last season's one-point loss at the Stadium Shootout at the University of Phoenix Stadium.

BYU will head to southern California to take on Fresno State at the Galen Center in Los Angeles on Dec. 12. Former Cougar head coach Steve Cleveland is at the helm of the Bulldog program. BYU returns to the Marriott Center following the neutral tilt at the Galen Center to host Wagner (Dec. 17) and Eastern Washington (Dec. 19) for its first two games of the Las Vegas Classic. The final two games of the Classic will be at the Orleans Arena in Las Vegas on Dec. 22 and 23. Nebraska, Nevada and Tulsa will also compete in the Classic. Matchups will be announced at a later date.

BYU's last game of the 2009 calendar year will be at Arizona on Dec. 28. The Cougars and Wildcats were conference rivals in the 1960s and 70s when both teams were members of the WAC. The final home non-conference game will be against Eastern New Mexico on Jan. 2 and the nonconference schedule will conclude at UTEP on Jan. 9.

Five of BYU's 2009-10 nonconference opponents—Idaho State, Weber State, Utah State, Arizona State and Tulsa—were on the schedule last season. Southern, Wagner and Eastern New Mexico are facing the Cougars for the first time. Nine of BYU's nonconference opponents qualified for postseason play in 2008-09, including Utah State, Arizona State and Arizona, which qualified for the NCAA Tournament. Arizona advanced to the Sweet 16, Arizona State advanced to the second round and Utah State was eliminated in the first round.

**CONFERENCE HOOPS SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED**

PROVO, Utah (July 31, 2009) – The Mountain West Conference has released the league schedule for BYU men's basketball along with the games televised by MWC broadcast partners CBS College Sports Network (CBS C), VERSUS and The Mtn.

The MWC television schedule features two BYU games on VERSUS, two on CBS C and 15 on The Mtn. The Mtn. will broadcast three home nonconference games—Bradley on Nov. 13, Weber State on Nov. 27 and Arizona State on Dec. 8—and 12 conference games. CBS C will broadcast conference clashes with San Diego State (Feb. 23 or 24 in Provo) and in-state rival Utah (March 3 in Salt Lake City). VERSUS will broadcast league games against UNLV (Feb. 6 in Las Vegas) and New Mexico (Feb. 27 in Provo). Any additional television broadcasts and game times will be announced at a later date.

The Cougars open conference play on Jan. 6 against UNLV (The Mtn.) in the Marriott Center. After stepping out of MWC action for a matchup with UTEP on Jan. 9 in El Paso, Texas, BYU will play at Air Force (The Mtn.) on Jan. 13. Colorado State (The Mtn.) and Wyoming (The Mtn.) come to the Marriott Center on Jan. 16 and 20, respectively. The Cougars then play two-straight on the road at San Diego State (The Mtn.) on Jan. 23 and at New Mexico (The Mtn.) on Jan. 27. The first half of the conference schedule concludes with home games against Utah (The Mtn.) on Jan. 30 and TCU (The Mtn.) on Feb. 2.

The second round of conference play starts with BYU visiting UNLV (VERSUS) on Feb. 6 and then hosting Air Force (The Mtn.) on Feb. 13. Games at Colorado State (The Mtn.) on Feb. 17 and Wyoming (The Mtn.) on Feb. 20 precede a pair of home matchups at the Marriott Center. San Diego State (CBS C) will play at the Marriott Center on either Feb. 23 or 24 followed by New Mexico (VERSUS) on Feb. 27.

BYU's conference schedule concludes with road games at Utah (CBS C) on March 3 and at TCU (The Mtn.) on March 6. The MWC Basketball Championship Tournament will be held in Las Vegas from March 10 to 13. The Mtn., CBS C and VERSUS will broadcast games at the Tournament.

Since becoming head coach of the BYU men's basketball program on April 11, 2005, Dave Rose has guided the Cougars to an impressive array of on-the-court awards and accolades while his unassuming approach to service and the community has been recognized at the top of his profession.

Cougar fans have had plenty to "Rise and Shout" about with Rose at the helm. He has produced a four-year resume that is nearly unmatched. His 97 victories place him tied for 12th for best career starts by wins in NCAA history, behind the likes of Mark Few, Jamie Dixon, Roy Williams and Jim Boeheim. Rose has returned BYU to the

national stage with three-straight appearances in the top-25 polls and three-straight NCAA Tournament berths. Under his tutelage, Rose's teams have not only broken into the top-25 rankings but also achieved the MWC's first-ever two-time outright league championships while adding a third in 2009 (shared with Utah and New Mexico). Rose is the only BYU men's basketball coach to win conference coach-of-the-year honors in back-to-back seasons. He has also received district coach of the year accolades and honorable mention for national coach of the year. Another evidence of Rose's commitment to excellence is that his basketball program ranks in the top 10 percent nationally in multi-year NCAA Academic Progress Rate scores. As a result, the NCAA has honored BYU with Public Recognition awards in each of the past three seasons for their high academic achievement.

Rose first came to BYU as an assistant in 1997 to help newly hired head coach Steve Cleveland rebuild the Cougar program. Rose served eight seasons with Cleveland, including the last five as associate head coach, before being promoted to BYU's head job. Rose played a vital role in rebuilding BYU's program from an inherited 1-25 team into a regular NCAA Tournament participant and 20-game winner. BYU has qualified for postseason play in nine of the past 10 seasons, including six NCAA bids, while claiming five MWC titles. A strong evaluator of talent with a vast network of coaching connections across the country, Rose has a proven record as a top recruiter. He has been recognized as one of college basketball's top-25 recruiters as BYU has had multiple top-20 recruiting classes with Rose overseeing or coordinating its efforts. Ten recruits have earned conference newcomer honors or a major league award in their first season as a Cougar in the 12 years Rose has been in Provo.

With 26 years of coaching experience—including 14 seasons as a head coach at the Division I, junior college and high school levels—Rose has a proven record of constant success. Prior to coming to BYU as an assistant in 1997, Rose compiled a 167-57 record at Dixie State College (St. George, Utah). Before being promoted to the head coaching position at Dixie, Rose served as a Rebel assistant coach under Ken Wagner for three seasons. Rose coached multiple sports at Millard and Pine View high schools in Utah before joining the staff at Dixie.

Rose excelled in both baseball and basketball as a two-sport athlete at Dixie State College in St. George, Utah, before serving a full-time mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Manchester, England, from 1977-79. Upon returning home, he transferred to the University of Houston where he completed his degree and was a shooting guard and co-captain of the famous "Phi Slamma Jamma" team featuring Hakeem Olajuwon and Clyde Drexler. In 1983 his Houston team was ranked No. 1 nationally and finished as the national runner-up.

A native of Houston, Texas, Rose and his wife Cheryl have three children and two grandchildren. Currently the Honorary Chairman of the Children with Cancer Christmas

Foundation, Rose works with his wife, Cheryl, and the team to annually serve and comfort local families who endure the challenges of raising a child who has cancer. Dave and Cheryl are also actively involved in a variety of other service and community initiatives. In 2008, Rose was honored by the National Association of Basketball Coaches with its Game Pillar Award for Service, one of only four Pillar Awards (Education, Leadership, Service and Advocacy) that the Association annually bestows on the most deserving among its vast membership. In 2008, Rose also became the 63rd recipient of the Dale Rex Memorial Award given annually to the person who has done the most for amateur athletics in the state of Utah.

**DAVE RICE**

Dave Rice joined the BYU coaching staff as an assistant in May 2005 and was promoted to Associate Head Coach in April 2008. Rice has 18 years of coaching experience, including 16 seasons at the Division I level at BYU, UNLV and Utah State. As a player, Rice was a member of UNLV's 1989-90 National Championship and 1990-91 Final Four teams that won a school-record 45 consecutive games. During his time as both a player and a coach, he has played with or helped guide 13 players who went on to play in the National Basketball Association, eight of whom were drafted in the first round, including six lottery picks.

An excellent recruiter and on-the-floor coach, Rice coordinates the teams offense and recruiting efforts. In his four seasons coordinating the Cougar offense, BYU has generated the Mountain West Conferences top attack three years and ranked second once. This past season the Cougars ranked among the top 20 nationally in numerous offensive categories, including scoring margin (9th, 11.9), field goal percentage (8th, 48.4), assists per game (16th, 16.3) and assist to turnover ratio (7th, 1.43). In 2007-08 BYU ranked 21st in assists per game (16.8) and 22nd in scoring margin (+10.5) while also setting a school record for assist-to-field goal ratio at 64.8 percent. In 2006-07, the Cougars ranked among the top 30 in the nation in three-point field-goal percentage (5th, 41.5), scoring (24th, 78.1 ppg) and scoring margin (25th, +9.0). In his first season at BYU, Rice helped the Cougars become the nations second-most improved team with a 20-9 overall record.

Rice has helped BYU earn four straight 20-win seasons and a 97-34 overall record while recording back-to-back outright Mountain West Conference Championships in 2007 and 2008 and sharing the title in 2009 the programs first string of three-straight titles since 1932-34. The Cougars have also appeared in the national top-25 polls and reached the NCAA Tournament in each of the last three seasons. The last time BYU was ranked in three-consecutive seasons was in 1980, 1981 and 1982.

Rice came to BYU from Utah State University where he helped Coach Stew Morrill and the Aggies earn a 24-8 record, Big West Conference Tournament title and an NCAA Tournament bid in 2004-05. In his one season at Utah State, Rices coaching duties included working with the offense and coaching the guards. In 2004-05, the Aggies led the nation in field-goal percentage (school-record .525) and ranked fourth nationally in scoring margin (+14.6), 10th in assists (17.2) and 20th in three-point field goal percentage (.391).

Rice spent 11 seasons as an assistant coach at UNLV, which is the second-longest tenure ever for an assistant in that program. While in Las Vegas, Rice worked under four head coaches including Jerry Tarkanian, Tim Grgurich, Bill Bayno and Charlie Spoonhour. In his last eight seasons at UNLV, the Runnin Rebels received seven postseason invitations and averaged 20 wins per year.

In addition to his Division I experience, Rice served as an assistant coach for one season at Chaffey (Calif.) College in 1994, helping the Panthers to a 32-6 record and an appearance in the California State Final Four. He also spent one season at Claremont (Calif.) High School, where he was an assistant coach under his father Lowell, a long-time high school coach. That team went 21-7, winning the Baseline League Championship and reaching the CIF quarterfinals. Rice earned his bachelors degree in political science from UNLV in 1991 and his MBA in 1993. He was also a two-time UNLV Scholar-Athlete of the Year and a Rhodes Scholar candidate.

Prior to playing at UNLV, Rice began his college career at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, Calif., where he earned All-South Coast Conference honors as a sophomore and was chosen from among more than 13,000 student-athletes as the 1989 California Junior College Scholar-Athlete of the Year. He graduated from Claremont High School. A native of Claremont, Calif., Rice and his wife Mindy have two sons, Travis and Dylan.

Boasting a 20-year, championship-filled coaching resume, John Wardenburg has been a key part of BYUs success since first coming to Provo in 2001.

Wardenburg joined the Cougar coaching staff as an assistant coach in May 2001 under former BYU coach Steve Cleveland before serving the past four seasons with current Cougar head coach Dave Rose. Wardenburg and Rose have a long coaching history together. Wardenburg served as an assistant to Rose at Dixie State College and before joining Rose as an assistant on Cleavelands staff at BYU.

On Roses staff the past four seasons, Wardenburg has helped the Cougars earn four-straight 20 wins seasons and a 97-34 overall record while recording back-to-back outright Mountain West Conference Championships in 2007 and 2008 and sharing the title in 2009 the programs first string of three-straight titles since 1932-34. BYU has also appeared in the national top-25 polls and reached the NCAA Tournament in each of the last three seasons. The last time the Cougars were ranked in three-consecutive seasons was in 1980, 1981 and 1982 and the previous Cougar team to be ranked was in 1993. During their first season with Rose at the helm in 2005-06, BYU became the nations second-most improved team with a 20-9 overall record.

Wardenburg's primary responsibilities on the staff have included defensive skill development, game film preparation, defensive game plan preparation, summer basketball camp director and recruiting. His efforts on the defensive end helped the Cougars finish the 2008-09 season ranked first in the MWC and 11th in the nation in three-point field goal percentage defense. BYU was also second in the league in steals and rebounding margin. In 2007-08 the Cougars were the 11th-ranked team in the nation in field-goal percentage defense, holding opponents to a combined 38.9 percent on the year. In addition to field-goal percentage defense in 2007-08, the Cougars were also the MWC's top team in three-point field-goal percentage defense (.300) and had the largest margin on the boards, grabbing 4.3 more rebounds per game than their opponents.

Prior to coming to BYU, Wardenburg had 13 years of coaching experience at the high school and junior college levels. He compiled a 105-62 record in seven years as a head coach at Payson High School (1988-93) and Pine View High School (1999-01) while guiding his teams to five league titles and seven state tournament berths. In those seven years, his teams earned three fifth-place state tournament finishes, one third-place finish and a 3A Utah State Championship with his 2001 Pine View team.

After Wardenburg's Payson teams claimed three league titles and posted a 76-43 overall record, he served as an assistant coach from 1993-97 at Dixie State College under current BYU head coach Dave Rose and helped the Rebels to a 95-31 record and a national ranking as high as No. 2. Wardenburg left coaching for two years to serve as Dixies Director of Athletics. He returned to coaching as the head coach at Pine View High School in St. George where he recorded two highly successful seasons before joining BYUs staff in 2001.

Wardenburg's Pine View teams won the league title both seasons he was the coach while achieving a 29-19 record. Wardenburg earned 3A Coach of the Year honors in 2000 after coaching his team to a third-place state finish and was named Championship Coach of the Year in 2001 after guiding his team to the state title.

Born in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Wardenburg was a multi-sport athlete at Kiel High School in Kiel, Wis. He served a mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints to The Netherlands from 1977-79 and earned a BA in political science from BYU in 1986 and an MA in health, physical education and recreation from Utah State in 1992.

Wardenburg and his wife, Pam, have four sons, Scott (Laura), Jonathan (Natalie), Adam and Barrett, and two granddaughters.

A former BYU point guard, Terry Nashif was hired as an assistant coach in June 2007 after serving two seasons on Dave Rose's staff as the Cougars' Director of Basketball Operations from 2005-07.

In his first season as an assistant coach, Nashif helped the Cougars achieve the second most wins in school history with a 27-8 record and become the only team in Mountain West Conference history to win two outright league titles. The 2007-08 Cougars won their second-straight outright regular-season MWC Championship with a 14-2. In Nashif's second season as an assistant BYU went 25-8 and earned a third-straight league title at 12-4 — the program's first string of three-straight titles since 1932-34. BYU has also appeared in the national top-25 polls and reached the NCAA Tournament in each of the last three seasons. The last time the Cougars were ranked in three-consecutive seasons was in 1980, 1981 and 1982 and the previous Cougar team to be ranked was in 1993.

In his four years overall on Rose's staff, Nashif has been a part of four straight 20-win seasons and a 97-34 overall record. Nashif's efforts in 2008-09 assisting with game film and defensive game plan preparation helped the Cougars finish ranked first in the MWC and 11th in the nation in three-point field goal percentage defense. BYU was also second in the league in steals and rebounding margin. In 2007-08 the Cougars were 11th in the nation in field-goal percentage defense, holding opponents to a combined 38.9 percent on the year. In addition to field-goal percentage defense in 2007-08, the Cougars were also the MWC's top team in three-point field-goal percentage defense (.300) and had the largest margin on the boards, grabbing 4.3 more rebounds per game than their opponents.

A native of Vancouver, Wash., Nashif first came to BYU in 2001 as a walk-on point guard and eventually earned a scholarship. A smart floor leader, Nashif appeared in 103 games for the Cougars, including 14 starts, as a member of two NCAA Tournament teams. As a sophomore in 2002-03, Nashif helped the Cougars claim a share of the Mountain West Conference regular-season title by ranking first among MWC players in assist/turnover ratio during league games. That season he played in every game, including six starts, and led BYU in assists (3.0) while averaging 2.2 points, his highest scoring average of his four-year career. He posted a career-high 11 points on 3-for-3 three-point shooting in 30 minutes at San Diego State and had one of the best games of his career against UNLV, tallying seven assists, four rebounds and two blocks while matching up against future NBA first-round draft pick Marcus Banks.

As a junior, Nashif played in 23 of 30 games despite missing a month due to illness, averaging 1.1 assists and 1.0 points per game. During his senior campaign in 2004-05, Nashif achieved a career-high eight rebounds against California and dished out a career-best 10 assists at USC while averaging 1.7 assists per game. He led the team in assists six times in 27 appearances with seven starts.

After graduating from BYU in 2005 with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Nashif was hired as the Director of Basketball Operations in Rose's first season at the helm. Nashif's primary responsibilities included coordinating team travel and providing support for academics, marketing and recruiting. He also organized team banquets and golf tournaments and provided assistance with all team-related activities.

Prior to coming to BYU, Nashif prepped at Evergreen High School in Vancouver, Wash., where he was the KVAN Radio Athlete of the Year, Columbian Player of the Year and Evergreen Defensive Player of the Year.

Nashif served a two-year mission for The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in Columbia, S.C. from 1999-2001. He and his wife Katie have one daughter, Macie.

**LAST OUTING:** Starting at point guard, shot 6-of-11 from the field for a team-high 15 points, adding six rebounds, five assists and a steal.

**SUMMARY:** A prolific scorer, guard Jimmer Fredette is a tough, hard-nosed competitor who was ranked by ESPN.com among the nation's top 75 high school shooting guards. Known for his shooting touch, Fredette set the league scoring record at Glens Falls High School (Glens Falls, N.Y.) with 2,404 career points. He was a significant contributor as a freshman, averaging 7.0 points off the bench. In 2008-09 he became BYU's first point guard to earn first-team all-conference honors since Marty Haws in 1990. Fredette averaged 16.2 points and 4.1 assists while contributing a team-best 50 steals. He also shot 48.0 percent from the field, 38.2 percent on threes and 84.7 percent from the free throw line. 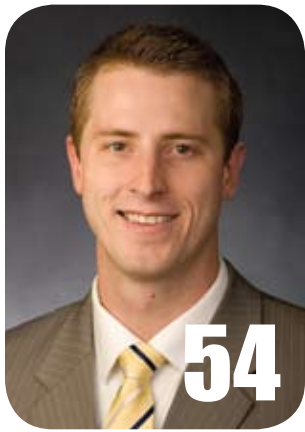

in program history and sixth in nine seasons.

With four-straight 20-win seasons to start his head coaching career at the NCAA Division I level, Rose joins G. Ott Romney and Roger Reid as the only head coaches in BYU men's basketball history to begin their careers in such fashion. His winning percentage (.740) and win total (97) are tops among the three. Rose is not only off to a blistering start in comparison to former BYU coaches, he is off to the best start of any coach in the history of the MWC. Rose is first in league history in winning percentage (.797), outright regular season titles (2), tied for first in regular season titles (3) and third in total conference victories (51).

In four years as a head coach, Rose has made waves nationally as well as in the MWC. Of the 47 coaches who took over a men's NCAA Division I program in 2005, Rose has the best winning percentage (.740) and is second for most wins (97), trailing only Tennessee's Bruce Pearl by one game. Also, of the 17 first-time Division I coaches who started in 2005, Rose leads with 97 wins, 12 ahead of Kent State's Geno Ford in second.

The big three—senior Lee Cummond, sophomore Jimmer Fredette and junior Jonathan Tavernari—earned All-MWC honors with Cummond and Fredette making the first team and Tavernari earning third-team honors. Jackson Emery joined the big three with a nod on the MWC All-Defense squad. Cummond and Fredette were named to the United States Basketball Writers Association All-District team while Cummond also earned all-district honors from the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

In addition to his conference and district recognition, FOXSports.com named Cummond a fourth-team All-America in his final campaign at BYU. The four-year starter also played in the Hershey's College All-Star game and the Portsmouth Invitational Tournament following the season. Cummond led the Cougars in scoring (16.8 points per game), three-point percentage (38.7), free throw percentage (87.1) and blocks (30). He was also second on the team with 6.2 rebounds

With expectations set high in the first three years of the Dave Rose era, BYU men's basketball turned in another strong campaign in 2008-09 as the Cougars claimed their fourth-straight 20-win season, third-straight Mountain West Conference regular season title and third-straight trip to the NCAA tournament.

"I am very proud of what we accomplished this season," Rose said. "After a tough start in conference play we finished strong to win a third-straight Mountain West Conference title and earn a bid to the NCAA tournament. We did all that despite returning just two starters. Our guys worked hard and fought through challenges to have an exceptional season."

Possibly the most impressive accomplishment of the 2008-09 squad was becoming the first program to win three-straight MWC regular season titles. After winning the league outright in 2007 and 2008, BYU shared the title with New Mexico and Utah despite returning just two starters and starting only one senior in a senior-dominated league.

The Cougars finished the year 25-8 overall and 12-4 in the MWC, winning 25 games for the third-straight year—a first in the history of BYU basketball and the 32nd 20-win season in the team's history. Rose also led the Cougars into the top 25 for the third-straight season, the first time since 1979-82 that BYU has been ranked for three-straight seasons. The Cougars' third-straight NCAA Tournament appearance marks the 24th overall

per game and 51.7 percent shooting from the field. Cummond finished the year ranked in the top-10 in eight statistical categories in the MWC. He concluded his BYU career ranking first in career games played and consecutive games played, fifth in consecutive games started, ninth in scoring, third in made threes, second in free throw percentage and sixth in career steals.

Fredette had the best season by a BYU point guard since Marty Haws averaged 18.5 points and 4.1 assists per game in 1990. Haws was also the last Cougar floor general to earn first-team all-conference honors. Fredette had one of the best statistical seasons of any player in the MWC, ranking in the top-five in five statistical categories, including scoring (5th), assists (3rd), free throw percentage (2nd), steals (2nd) and minutes played (4th). He was also eighth in assist/turnover ratio. He led the team in assists (4.1) and steals (1.5) and was second in scoring (16.2), three-point shooting (38.2 percent and 52 makes) and free throw shooting (84.7 percent and 116 makes) and third in field goal percentage (48.0 percent). With 780 career points he is on pace to become the 40th member of BYU's 1,000-point club.

Tavernari, a three-time MWC honoree—including third-team honors in 2008 and freshman of the year recognition in 2007—was third on the team in scoring (15.7) and first in rebounding (7.2). He was third on the team shooting 38.1 percent from downtown and made 85 threes—the second most in a single season at BYU after he set the record with 88 treys in 2008. Tavernari was also second on the team with 49 steals. In the MWC he finished in the top-10 in six statistical categories including fourth in rebounding, third in steals, second in three-pointers per game and second in defensive rebounds per game. On the season Tavernari scored in double figures 26 times, had 20-plus points 10 times and registered a team-high seven double-doubles.

Emery contributed significantly to BYU's success, starting 32 games and averaging 7.8 points and 3.8 rebounds while finishing second on the team with 49 steals and third with 100 assists. Emery was fifth in the MWC in steals and first in assist/turnover ratio. He often came up big in the biggest games, notably in late season must-win situations when the MWC regular season title was on the line. Against New Mexico at home he posted a career-high 19 points while adding six rebounds, two steals and two assists. In BYU's comeback win at San Diego State, Emery had 12 points, six boards, four assists and two steals. In the title-clinching victory against Air Force in the regular season finale he had 15 points, six rebounds and a career-best six steals.

Junior Chris Miles started 33 games at center and contributed 7.1 points per game, 4.0 rebounds and a team-best field goal percentage of 57.0 percent. He was also second on the team with 26 blocks and added 23 steals and 42 assists. Miles posted a career-high 24 points in a win over Cal Poly and had big games against Utah's Luke Nevill, the MWC Player of the Year. In the 94-88 overtime loss in Salt Lake City he had 14 points, six rebounds and three steals and in the 63-50 win at home Miles posted 13 points, two blocks and tied his career-high with eight rebounds. He also limited Nevill to nine points.

Despite the bench players having limited game experience coming into the 2008-09 season, several players contributed and showed potential for playing bigger roles in the future. Junior guard Lamont Morgan, Jr., spelled Fredette and Emery at guard and led the bench players in scoring at 3.6 points per game. He also added 60 assists and 15 steals while shooting 41.2 percent from downtown. Freshman Charles Abouo contributed 2.9 points per game and added athleticism and several highlight reel-plays. One of his best games came against nationally ranked Wake Forest when he had 10 points and five rebounds.

Freshman James Anderson showed flashes of his potential as a scoring and defensive threat on the post. Against Boise State he had 10 points, seven boards and five blocks. At home against Colorado State he had a career-best 16 points to go with seven boards and two blocks. In a key MWC win at Wyoming he chipped in seven points and five boards and the conference semis he had six points and two blocks vs. San Diego State. Noah Hartssock, another freshman post player, came on strong late in the season. In BYU's comeback win at San Diego State he had seven points, seven boards, a block and two steals. In the final two games of the season—the MWC semis and the NCAA tournament—he posted a combined 17 points, nine boards and three blocks.

BYU opened the 2008-09 season with 10-straight wins, including six at home that extended what was a school record and the nation's best home winning streak to 53 games. Cummond dropped 36 on Long Beach State in the season opener and the Cougars won at Pepperdine before sweeping through the Basketball Travelers Invitational at the Marriott Center to improve to 5-0. After road wins at Idaho State and Weber State, BYU took down in-state rival Utah State 68-63 at Energy Solutions Arena. The Cougars then won two more home games against Boise State and Portland.

The perfect start ended with a one-point loss to the No. 20 Arizona State at University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. BYU led throughout the game before All-American James Harden hit a free throw with nine seconds remaining to put the Sun Devils up by one at 76-75. Charles Abouo's tip at the buzzer was initially called good but after a review on the floor was waved off. The Cougars rebounded with a win at Tulsa led by Cumnard's 26 points.

The next week the home winning streak came to an end with a 94-87 loss to then-No. 6 Wake Forest. Fredette had a breakout game in the loss with 23 points—including 18 in the first half—and nine assists against All-American Jeff Teague. BYU concluded its non-conference schedule with a win at home against Western Oregon.

BYU started strong in MWC play, winning big at Colorado State and taking down TCU at home. The Cougars then headed to New Mexico looking to improve to 3-0 in the MWC for the first time under Rose. The Lobos had other plans, however, and handed BYU its worst loss of the season. With UNLV visiting the Marriott Center the Cougars looked to bounce back but the Rebels erased a 13-point halftime lead and BYU suffered its first home loss in conference play since 2005. The Cougars started another home-court winning streak with a win over San Diego State but fell the next week in overtime at Utah.

With a 3-3 record in conference play and a third-straight MWC regular season title slipping out of reach, BYU responded. As they had in the previous three seasons under Rose the Cougars ended the season on a tear, winning nine of 10—the only loss coming in a one-point defeat at UNLV. BYU started the run with a five-game winning streak that included home wins against Wyoming, Colorado State and New Mexico and road wins over Air Force and TCU. Following the UNLV loss the Cougars overcame a 14-point deficit to win at San Diego State behind 28-points from Fredette. Still trailing league-leader Utah by two games with three to play, BYU downed the Utes at home 63-50 behind another strong game from Fredette, who netted 25 points in the win.

After trimming the deficit in the league standings to one game, the Cougars won at Wyoming while Utah lost to New Mexico, creating a three-way tie between BYU, the Utes and the Lobos. On the final day of the regular season Utah and New Mexico won early in the day to secure a share of the title for each team. The Cougars took on Air Force in front of a sold-out Marriott Center in the nightcap and pulled away in the final minute of the game to seal the victory and a share of the MWC title.

BYU opened the postseason with an 80-69 win over Air Force in the first round of the MWC tournament to give the Cougars their 10th win in 11 games. In the semifinals BYU failed to advance to a third-straight conference tournament title game, falling short against San Diego State. Two days later the Cougars learned they had received the program's 24th berth to the NCAA tournament. For the second-straight season BYU faced Texas A&M as the No. 8 seed, this time in Philadelphia. Unfortunately for the Cougars the outcome was the same as 2008 as the Aggies eliminated BYU 79-66 in the first round.
